FAST ATLANTIC SERVICE.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13—Early consideration of the question of the establishment of a fast Atlantic service is promised on the return of Right Hon. R. L. Borden and his colleagues from London. This subject will be among the first to be dealt with by the full cabinet. It is learned that during his stay in England, Premier Borden has received a renewal of the offer of the syndicate including Sir Thomas Troubridge, for the establishment of a fast service from Halifax to Black-sod Bay.

The promoters of the proposed fast service are understood to be for the usual government assistance and propose to do today what they proposed to do in 1907. The offer includes a service not only to Halifax, but also to the Pacific. It is probable that a more formal offer will be placed before the government by those interested in the scheme and will be considered when the whole question comes before council this fall.

The remains of the late Alexander H. McLean, who was drowned previous to August 8th in Harrison River, E. C., arrived in Charlottetown by express last night. They were consigned to Donald McLean, Grand View, P. E. I., and will be forwarded to their destination via the Murray Harbor train.

ELECTRICAL STORM SEVERE

SACKVILLE, N. B., Aug. 13—Probably the worst electrical storm that ever visited Sackville passed over here this morning lasting from midnight until four o'clock. A barn belonging to Joseph Reid of Frosty Hollow was struck and burned to the ground. The Catholic Church at Middle Sackville was badly damaged, the steeple being almost demolished. The house of Stephen Devarone of Middle Sackville was struck, but only damaged slightly. The residences of Charles Wry, Foundry St., house and barn of Walter Kilcup, as well as numbers of barns on the marshes were damaged to some extent. The rain descended in torrents and the country is flooded. The dams at Morice Lake, Ogdens Mills and Bulmers went out causing great damage.

Fears are entertained that some of the streets of the town will be flooded by water from Morice Lake. Great quantities of hay are rotting on the marshes and the situation from the farmers standpoint is extremely serious. Number 10 express ran into a washout below Sackville at four o'clock this morning. The passengers received a severe jolting but the train did not leave the rails. Later on two washouts occurred between Sackville and Dorchester. The trains are all somewhat delayed.

SOME FACTS.

In 1891 The Morning Daily Guardian was established, and is still issued each morning with the latest local and foreign news, including the Canadian Press and a special telegraphic service.

In 1897 The Weekly Guardian was established, but its issue proved too infrequent for readers of the Province advanced, and from time to time was changed, first to a Semi-Weekly, then to a Tri-Weekly, and later to a Rural Daily, so that for years The Guardian has issued two dailies, as at present—one in the morning as a Morning Daily, and the other in the afternoon as a Rural Daily. As the name of the latter was never sufficiently clear as to what it implied and always required much explanation, it was in May last changed to Evening Daily, and continued as an afternoon paper.

For some time past the management has felt that Prince Edward Island is justly entitled to a twenty-four hour telegraphic news service, as enjoyed by the other Provinces of Canada, rather than the night wire service only, as up to June 30th last supplied by The Morning Guardian and afterwards printed in The Evening Guardian. Accordingly a representative visited St. John and arranged for a Canadian Press day service, which is appreciated by the general public.

It is thus to The Guardian that the people of Prince Edward Island are indebted, first for a night Canadian Press service and now for the day Canadian Press and Special Telegraphic news published since July first and thus enjoyed by its readers.

CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the sender, who is frequently not known to any member of the staff and who has no account in the advertising department, writes "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department, and thus subscribers have no privilege of free advertising and are on the same footing as non subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or the Rural Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches & than for regular business. In all such cases, the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc. of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., are chargeable if an admission fee, silver collection, sale of church or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even tho' a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any page or column in News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc. of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. 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
