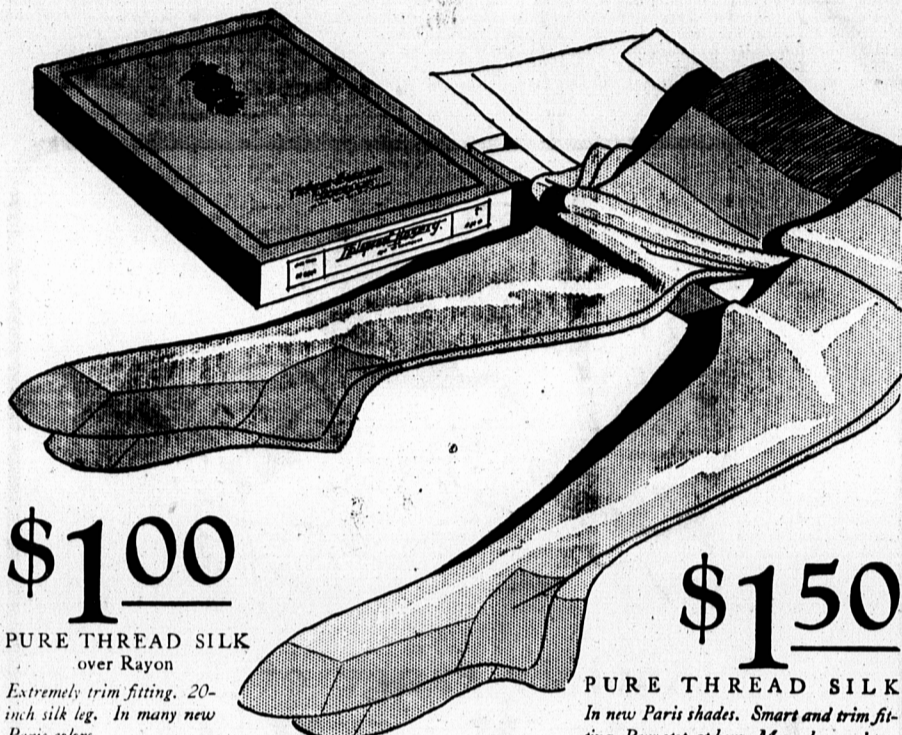

Montcalm Coming to Open Navigation

Mr. J. O. Hyndman, President of the Associated Boards of Trade for this Province has wired Mr. R. H. Jenkins, M. P., suggesting that the "Montcalm", which was to leave Sydney yesterday with mails, etc., for the Magdalenes, on her return proceed to Charlottetown and open the port.

Mr. Hyndman received a prompt reply from Mr. Jenkins, stating that he had arranged with the Department that the "Montcalm" after her trip to the Magdalenes, and when leaving there proceed to Charlottetown. It is understood that the ice conditions were pretty bad, but nevertheless the steamer will make the attempt to come to Charlottetown, and Mr. Jenkins hoped this would be quite satisfactory to all concerned.

This is business; and it is hoped that the "Montcalm" will the latter part of this week or early next arrive at Charlottetown. This will open the harbour to navigation, and will have a stimulating effect on business generally.

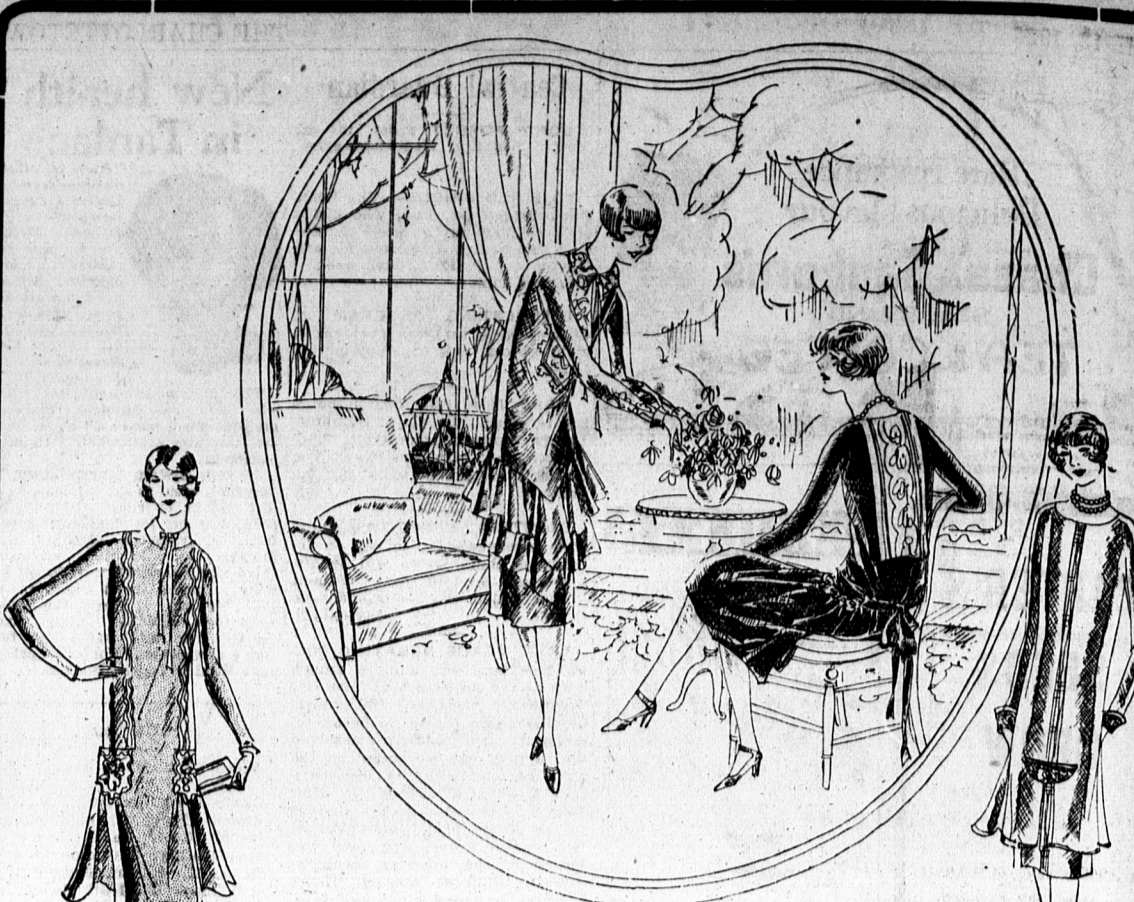
