

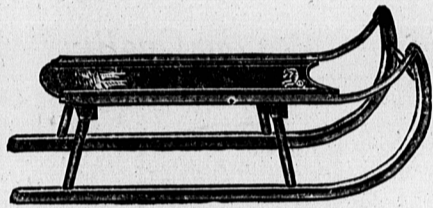

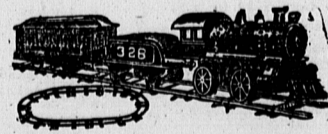

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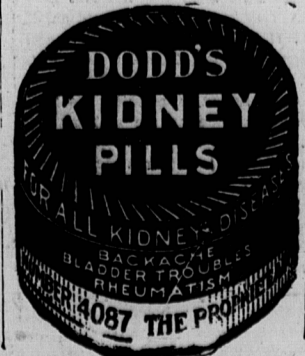

VISITORS AT NASSAU, BAHAMAS

With the main sail spliced and with seamlike bindings holding the oar and spare part spinnies along its length the "Wanderbird" 60 days out of Cayes, England, and captained by Warwick M. Thompson made port. The last port was Vigo La Palmas and the Atlantic run from there was made in 23 days.

Accompanying the journalist, artist, navigator and director of sail is his wife and Miss Barbara Leighton, graduate of the school of art, Paris, homeward bound to New York to open a career. A crew of eight with a mate who served in the Imperial German Navy and a boatswain who can sing German Grand Opera they have been for over six months at sea. The crisp tale of the tacturn Thompson, the swarthy necks and bronzed shoulders, the Bretonhead sailors pants and shirt of red, the squaring aloft and the air of seagoing-readiness, combine to form an unforgettable picture.

The boom cracked in mid Atlantic and had to be "fishtailed" and re-set. The weather had been ideal until the squall and after it passed the run to Bahamas was merely a pleasant outing. All summer this cruising yacht of 75 feet and 20 beam has been taking young men and woman on training cruises around the coast of England and Scotland. Young Britons could by paying \$750 spend six months in this commodious schooner receive practical instruction in navigation and go back to their schools or businesses restored in health and graduate in some degree of square rig and canvas.

Captain Tompkins, master and owner is a sea lover—he gives an order and lays on the rope and to the tune of "Pipe Her Down" a big boom to replace that disabled was hoisted by all hands on board.
