**VESSEL GONE TO PIECES**—St. John's, Nfld., papers report that the new schooner, Barbara McDonald from P.E. Island which was recently wrecked on the coast of Newfoundland has gone to pieces.  
**TERM EXPIRED**—The Royal Gazette in its last issue contains notice to the effect that "George W. Gardiner has been appointed King's Printer and Publisher of the Royal Gazette for this Province for the years 1920, 1921, 1922 and 1923, vice Archibald Irwin whose term expires on the 31st December, 1919."  
**BONUS TO STAFF**—The Canadian Bank of Commerce has declared a cash bonus to the staff of 10 per cent, to those receiving salaries up to \$5,000 per annum, and 5 per cent, to those receiving over \$5,000, with a minimum of \$500. In addition, a general increase in salaries has been granted on an approximate scale of 10 per cent, exclusive of the highest salaried officers.  
**HOTEL STAFF BANQUETED**—The management of the Victoria Hotel last evening gave their employees a delightful surprise in the form of a splendid banquet prepared in the hotel's best style. The entire staff of 24 persons not only enjoyed the banquet but were made additionally happy by the presentation of useful gifts to each. Another incidental feature was the gift of a handsome reading lamp to Manager and Mrs. Brown by the hotel staff which was suitably acknowledged.  
**MISSING P. E. I. CAPTAIN**—The Halifax Recorder says: Capt. Walsh, of the schooner Beaver, lying in Dartmouth Cove, has been missing since Saturday afternoon, when he went in a small boat from the schooner. He lived on board the vessel. Early this week the row boat which he used was found floating bottom up near Mott's wharf at Dartmouth. Captain James Walsh, who is supposed to have been drowned, was 62 years of age. In 1918 the schooner Beaver was sold by the owners in P. E. I. to West Indies parties, but shortly afterward litigation started. Capt. Walsh was put in charge. Saturday last he had dinner with his sister, Mrs. James Hall, wife of Sheriff Hall, and he left a friend's house at Dartmouth at 5 p. m. to go to his vessel. His small row boat was at Mott's wharf, and it is thought that in getting in it he lost his balance and fell overboard. He however, was not missed until Thursday, as it was thought he had gone on a visit to his wife and family in Summerside, P. E. I.
