SUPREME COURT.

Musgrave vs. Lock. The defendants closed their defence in this action yesterday morning and Mr. McQuarrie, K.C., one of their Counsel, addressed the jury on their behalf. He was followed by Mr. Matheson, K.C., one of the Counsel for the plaintiff, on his behalf. The Chief Justice then charged the jury who retired and after an absence of one and a half hours returned a verdict for the defendants, two jurors dissenting. The verdict of the five jurors was accepted and recorded for the defendants.

Haszard, K. C., and Mathieson, K. C., for the plaintiff; Johnson and McQuarrie, K. C., for the defendants.

This being the last jury case the Court adjourned until Monday at 11.
