The lower part of the City was in the densest darkness last night, candles and lamps burned in the hotels, the railway station was illumined by searchlights, and passengers were taken up the Steam Navigation wharf by the aid of a lantern. **EASTERN NOTES.**—Rev. A. N. Simpson spent a week pleasantly among his many friends here.—Seth Stewart left again for Boston after a week's visit to his old home. The weather has been extremely wet, seriously interfering with late hay-making.—Harvesting was completed a twelve month ago, the earliest harvest in the Island's history none cut this year, difference due to temperature, rainfall and different climatic conditions. We may say we have had no thunder here this summer, in striking contrast with late years when the most furious electric storms spread fear and distraction in many different parts of the country.—Considerable excitement is caused just now among fishermen and others by a body of mackerel off West River taking the hook freely and the grizzled fishermen of a quarter of a century ago, who caught them in numbers before they were destroyed by the American purse seine are sharpening up their rusted hooks, repairing their bait mills and rushing for their share of the spoils.—William Ford has left his forge, Arthur Robertson has left his farm, Silas Robertson has left his agency, all temporarily certainly to spend a short time at the exciting, the profitable business. William Young caught a barrel one evening after going the round of his milk route. William Coffin caught more than two barrels the same day. From 100 to 600 mackerel per man per day are the average catches. Ever since the bulk of this fish has been destroyed a remnant has reserved every summer to small bank south of East Point from this bank, currents being favorable they come in on the sandy bottom off West River and a limited quantity is taken each season, while as close as Basin Head is but few are taken there and the historic old coves of Red Point, Little Harbor and Cheapstow, once famous for their mackerel fisheries are now seldom visited by them. The beach at Number one where a fishing village once existed with a good many boats is now deserted not a boat fishing there this season as there is no mackerel to fish.—Hake is not as good as other years on the south side, scarce in quantity. Their favorite grounds are west from the resorts of the mackerel.
