

LEGISLATURE AND COMMITTEE ON MILK BILL

In the Legislature on Thursday, on motion of Mr. Wright, the House went into Committee on the Milk Bill.

The promoter explained that a similar bill was introduced last year but owing to the fact that the consumers had not been consulted, nothing was done.

The title of the bill was amended to include "consumers" as well as producers and distributors.

The bill authorized the Government in Council to appoint a Board to consist of three persons, one of whom shall represent the consumers, one the milk and cream producers and distributors, and the third to be the Dairy Superintendent of the Province.

Mr. Wright agreed it was necessary that poor children in Charlottetown obtain milk at the lowest possible price.

Mr. Wright moved, as an amendment to the section authorizing the Board to grant licenses, the Board should be composed of representatives of the consumers as well as the producers and distributors.

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Mr. Trainor moved, as another amendment: "The Board shall have power after investigation to recommend to the Legislature any measure which may be made between any licensee under this Act and any association of fifteen or more persons, or any person or persons, or any association for the sale of fluid milk or cream to the members of such association at a price lower than the general price fixed in the regulations."

Look Over Long List Of Annuals And Choose A Few New Ones—Hundreds to Pick From—Describes nine Beauties.

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ISLAND FISH LANDINGS INCREASED Total Catch For Maritime Times, However, Compared To Last Year Decreased.

(By The Canadian Press) HALIFAX, Apr. 24—A decline of 2,874,900 pounds in the fish catch in the eastern Division, Department of Fisheries, and a corresponding decrease of \$62,286 in its landed value for March, 1938, as compared with March of last year was noted in the monthly report of the department, released tonight.

Production of fish within the Maritimes for the month under review was 14,339,000 pounds with a landed value of \$265,041. During March, 1937, the production was 17,264,300 pounds with a landed value of \$327,937.

The haddock catch decreased by 2,104,500 pounds and by \$39,000 in landed value, this decrease accounting for the greater proportion of the total decline shown for the month.

The catch and landed value by provinces in March, 1938, with last year's figures in brackets: New Brunswick, 12,841,000 (15,084,200); \$266,351. (\$328,450); Nova Scotia, 1,931,400 (2,174,200); \$18,521. (\$18,804); Prince Edward Island, 1,000,000 (1,180,000); \$18,900. (\$18,900).

Like the province of New Brunswick, fishing in Prince Edward Island during March is light. Only three vessels were licensed, 16 silversides, flounders and tomcod. Comparison with the catch of March 1937 is as follows:

Total quantity of all fish landed—16,900 lbs.; landed value, \$169. Silversides, 11,200 pounds; value \$112. Flounders, 3,500 pounds; value, \$35. Tomcod, 2,200 pounds; value, \$22.
