## THE TRIAL OF CURTIS CONTINUES

### Evidence Given By Provincial Police Officer Jay On Curtis' Alleged Confession.

The evidence of Provincial Police Officer Jay containing the alleged confession of Otto Curtis, now on trial for manslaughter in the Supreme Court before Mr. Justice Saunders and a jury, was heard at the trial of the accused yesterday. According to the evidence Curtis stated that he saw an object on the road from a distance of about seventy-five yards. When about thirty feet from the object he realized that it was a man, but was unable to stop.

Mr. Morris had been working about the motor in the garage, when the discharge was heard. He was found lying beside the car, and doctors were summoned at once, but life was extinct.

## Frauds Unearthed In Civil Service

### Arrest Of Prominent Official Of The Commission Expected Soon—Alleged That Examination Papers Were Filled Out At Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 19.—Arrest of a prominent official of the Civil Service Commission is expected soon, according to a news page story in the Journal today. Evidence implicating this official is said to have been unearthed by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. It is stated the official in question headed a job ring whereby candidates for positions in the postal services at Montreal paid from \$400 and \$500 each to have their examination papers filled out at Ottawa where they came to be marked. The first arrest in connection with the frauds was made today when Lionel Chartrand of Aylmer, Que., was taken into custody. Chartrand was employed in the offices here of the Income Tax Department.

## UNITED STATES AFTER THE COMMUNISTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Declaring that between 500,000 and 600,000 Communists organized under leaders in twenty divisions in this country, with headquarters in New York directed from Moscow, were agitating for the overthrow of the American political and economic systems, the Fish committee in its report on eight months of investigation submitted to the House Saturday fourteen recommendations for legislation to combat Communism.

It was recommended that Congress take immediate steps to outlaw the Communist party in America, cancelling the citizenship of its members to deport all alien Communists, to prevent further naturalization of Communists, to bar Communist publications from the mails and to prosecute Communists or other persons, organizations, newspapers, etc., for spreading false rumors for the purpose of starting runs on the banks.

## Pastor Dies At Age 93

AMHERST, N. S., Jan. 19.—Rev. Dr. A. E. Steele, pastor emeritus of First Baptist Church here, and widely known denominational leader, died at his home today in his ninety-third year. His illness was brief. Dr. Steele, a native of Hertfordshire, England, came out to Canada in 1845 and after serving his apprenticeship as a printer in Halifax, entered the ministry, graduating from Acadia in 1865. After two years at Canso, he removed to Amherst, preaching here for 29 years. He was formerly a member of the board of governors of Acadia University.

It is unfortunate that there is no distinct Canadian art, music or architecture, said Rabbi Berger.
