Verdict—Accidentally drowned by falling over South Pinette Bridge.

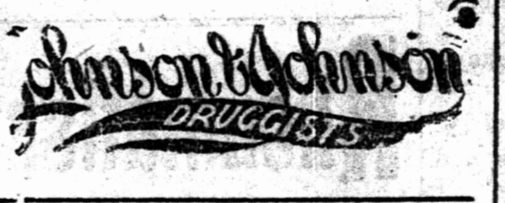
L. L. BERN, returned last night from River John where he has been in connection with the wreck of the Jacques-Cartier which went ashore there early Saturday morning in the heavy gale blowing at that time. The vessel is a total wreck, and will be sold by auction on Friday next. All the cargo has been saved and is very little damaged. Captain Walker says that when the ship lost her rudder she was within twenty minutes sail of Victoria. The Captain, whose management of the ship under the circumstances is highly commendable endeavored to steer by means of a jib but owing to the gale was unable to effect his purpose. He then tried to beach on the Island shore but the wind shifted to the north and in this too, he was foiled. He next endeavored to make Pictou harbor. This was also impossible and the Cartier went ashore at Cape John where she now lays on a sandy bottom close under a forty foot bank. From twilight in the evening of Friday till four the next morning the craft and crew had been drifting in the Straits at the mercy of the gale and their experience was a trying one. They managed however to reach the land in safety and are now well housed and comfortable at River John. Several of the crew are expected to arrive in the City to night by the Princess. A Pictou exchange in speaking of the affair says it is understood that the crew had a very narrow escape from death and have been exhausted by their great struggle for life. It is stated that they were up to their necks in water, but whether in their efforts at landing or by the seas breaking over them has not been ascertained.
