## Landrigan Sets Record In Opening Day's Shoot

### Wins Three Matches And Scores 167 Out Of Possible 170 Points In P. R. A. Meet

The 72nd annual prize meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association commenced yesterday morning at 1:30. The weather was hot with a slight wind blowing from the southwest. During the day this changed several times, giving marksmen plenty of opportunities to judge it and the heavy mirage which was generated by the heat. Upwards of forty-five marksmen were in attendance and this number would have been larger no doubt by the fact that some of the out-of-town marksmen were busy making hay.

When the Solons who draw up the rules of the game of the national Rifle Association meetings in Biley adopted the five-inch bullet size at 200 yards instead of the .22-inch, and the fifteen inch for 300 and 400 yards instead of the 18-inch, they no doubt figured that they were putting up a very tough proposition for the marksmen, but it didn't seem to change the scores very materially yesterday. For instance, Signaller P. J. Landrigan, the veteran of the range and of the Great War, selected yesterday as his day 100-yard record of all kinds. One of them was winning three matches in one day. This he accomplished by shooting a perfect score—ten bulls' eyes in the MacKinnon Match; 49 points out of fifty in the Prowse Bros. Ltd. match and 58 points out of 70 in the Moore & McLeod Match—a total score of 167 out of 170 points, a record for the local range.

#### Good Scores Carded

Q. M. Sgt. A. Gormley was second to Landrigan in the MacKinnon Match with 48 out of 50 points and there were a lot of other good scores. Private G. A. Coles and J. B. Coles were runner-up to Sig. Landrigan in the Prowse Bros. Ltd. Match, 46 points out of 50, while Private Eric Coles and Q. M. Sgt. A. Gormley trailed him for second and third places respectively in the Moore and McLeod Match.

Lt. Percy Hooper of Milton, who had been shooting consistently all day, captured the fourth match shot yesterday, the City of Charlottetown, fired at 300 and 400 yards, with a score of 67 out of 70 points. Roy McCabe had exactly the same score but Hooper's was the better 67. There were a lot of good scores in this match, which was fired under difficult conditions of wind and mirage, particularly at the 600 yards.

The Green Shot Match fired in conjunction with the MacKinnon Match, was won by Earl Bunney with a score of 47 points out of 50—an excellent performance and one that stamps Mr. Bunney as a coming rifle shot.

#### Highlanders Win Match

The British Consols Team Match for teams from units making the highest scores in the challenge round of the Davis Cup today as Don Budge and Gene Mako defeated the British doubles pair of C.R.D. Tuckey and P.H.D. Wilde. The score was 5-3, 7-9, 12-10.

## United States Takes Lead In Davis Cup Play As Budge And Mako Defeat British Pair

WIMBLEDON, July 26—(AP)—The United States tennis team went into a 2-1 lead over Great Britain in the challenge round of the Davis Cup today as Don Budge and Gene Mako defeated the British doubles pair of C.R.D. Tuckey and P.H.D. Wilde. The score was 5-3, 7-9, 12-10.

Deciding singles matches tomorrow will send Charles Hare against Frank Parker, while H.W. "Bunny" Austin will face Budge.

Hare, who took Budge through 28 games before losing the first set, and later the match, to him Saturday, is favored to turn back Parker. Retention of the famous cup, symbol of amateur tennis supremacy, which Britain has held since 1923, will then depend on Austin's ability to hold the California ace.

Austin defeated Parker in straight sets Saturday.

#### Wilde Off Form

It was evident in the first set that Wilde was well off form with his back-hand. Whenever possible Budge and Mako kept the ball away from Tuckey and whacked it low at Wilde's weak side. The strategy worked, for Wilde kept getting the ball and getting the splendid play of Tuckey overhead grabbed the Britons to keep in the running.

Tuckey and Wilde gained an early advantage by breaking Mako's service in the first set, but a 1-1 lead. The Americans, however, took the net on Wilde's service and with brilliant smashes tied up the scores.

In the Moore and McLeod Match she finished ninth with a score of 64 out of 70 points, a highly meritorious performance.

#### Cup Winners

Considerable resentment was generated because of the annoyance from the dust and sand blown over targets and competitors by the mixer works located near the shooting pavilion. At times this was so bad that it became an actual handicap to those firing.

Today will wind up the matches with the Lt.-Governor's Match, the highlight of the meeting for which \$100 is donated by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, Hon. R. G. DeBlois, and for which two medals are presented by the P. R. A. This match carries by far the largest prize list and there is sure to be the keenest of competition in it. It will get underway at 8:30 and will be fired in the morning and the 600 yards in the afternoon. Shortly afterwards the Ladies' Challenge Trophy Match—10 shots at 600 yards—will be shot. In this competition the thirty highest riflemen in the Grand Aggregate will represent 30 ladies and the Ladies Challenge Cup will go to the lady whose rifeman makes the highest score. The riflemen will receive the Army and Navy Club and a prize.

At the conclusion of the Ladies' Challenge Trophy Match the Governor General's medals, the D. C. R. medals, the various trophies and the Davison Challenge Cup for the winner of the Ottawa Aggregate will be presented.

Victors are usually numerous on the final afternoons of provincial shoots. This year in order to give them an opportunity of seeing the Ladies' Challenge Trophy Match fired and also witnessing the presentation of prizes, the schedule of matches has been advanced so that the Ladies' Challenge match will likely be fired at or about 4 o'clock, with the presentation of prizes following almost immediately after. The public are cordially invited to be present.

### Quebec Team Wins Trophy At Ottawa

OTTAWA, July 26—Quebec's four-man golfing squad, led by the brilliant play of Phil Farley, today won the inter-provincial amateur team championship and possession of the Willington Cup, held for the last year by British Columbia.

Boosted along by Farley's par-cracking 71 afternoon round, the Quebec team finished with an aggregate of 619, a single stroke better than Ontario.

British Columbia pulled into third place with 630 and Manitoba, after holding a one-stroke lead at the end of the morning round, faltered badly despite the great effort of Bobby Reith, Manitoba champion. Reith shot an afternoon 72, one under par, but his mates could not produce the necessary support.

Manitoba, in fourth place, had an aggregate medal score of 634. Alberta came through with 644. The New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island combination with 673 and Saskatchewan trailed with 688.

Pete Kelly's New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island squad was never in the running, though the Charlottetown red headed hockey play-spoiler got away to a fine start himself. He was moving along at par figures till the rain poured down and then his score mounted. He had 80 and 79 for his two rounds, well in the lead for his team. Dr. E. O. Turner of Fredericton posted 85 and 83. Aubrey Steeves of Moncton, N. B., and Percival Streeker of Saint John had grand totals of 173 each, Steeves with 87 and 86 and Streeker with 81 and 82. The 91 was the high mark of the competition.

Morning scores generally were wrecked by a terrific rainstorm that swept the course in driving sheets for half an hour. There wasn't a par in the morning 18-hole round. Within an hour the sun came out and the course began drying out rapidly but the toll in strokes was already counted.

### Newport "Cup Conscious" As Date For Renewal Of Yachting Classic Nears

NEWPORT, R. I., July 26—(CP)—Endeavour, Great Britain's blue-hulled challenger for the long lost America's Cup, will go out to the starting line for the first race off the Newport coast Saturday something of a dark horse.

With the fleets already gathering for the opening race of the four-out-of-seven series and the 16th renewal of the classic international yachting tilt, little was known of Endeavour II's capabilities.

Probably T. O. M. Sopwith, British airplane manufacturer and sportsman who financed the challenger, knows more about his new vessel than anybody. He has appeared satisfied but has disclosed little.

"Why should I show my hand?" Sopwith invariably told reporters. "We have a job to do and we are doing it in our own way."

"We are quite satisfied with what we have done. We know Ranger is a good boat but we think we have a good boat too. Our men are fit. We have a good crew. I think it will be very good racing."

#### No Times Disclosed

No comparative times were revealed of the task to which Sopwith set his boats in spite of the fact some American yachtsmen criticized the British skipper for not pitting the vessels in a definite trial series. They said he was not making the best use of the second boat to lure the challenger to racing perfection.

In 1934 Sopwith, in his first essay with Endeavour I, won the first two races of the series but Vanderbilt, then defending the cup, second time, skipped Rainbow to victory in the next four races.

Newport is ready for the fray. Normally a quiet exclusive resort where mansions crest the cool, rocky Atlantic coasting the port, is more than ever "cup conscious."
