St. James Church Picton has procured the services of Rev. Mr. White as rector. Mr. White comes from Pugwash where he has been supplying the pulpit of Rev. Mr. Cox, who was Chaplain with the first Contingent.

THE Stanley left yesterday morning with 421 boxes smelts, 163 pkgs beef, 130 dressed hogs, 30 bbls meats, 324 bus. oats, and sundries. There were 12 passengers including Corporal Macdonald from Kensington. The Minto arrived yesterday at 10:30 with 12 passengers and 10 cars mixed freight.

ALL trains were running on time yesterday with the exception of No. 2 from Tignish which was detained about six hours and did not arrive in the city until 10:15. The principal loss of time was between Bloomfield and Alberton and Port Hill and Wellington. The snow-storm in the western section was very heavy and has caused a great deal of heavy work on the part of the P. E. I. R.R.

Mr. Fullerton's lecture on Paardeberg, Bloemfontein and the surrender of Cronje. The events described were those which included the most interesting and critical stages of the war, in which also two of our Island boys were killed and others had narrow escapes or distinguished themselves by acts of gallantry. Among those whose adventures and experiences were mentioned were E. Lord, A. Dillon, F. B. McRae, E. Bowness, Neezy Dorion, Hedley McKinnon, James Matheson, O'Reilly and others. Excellent views of scenes and portraits of generals vividly illustrated the lecture, which was throughout of graphic and engaging interest. Experiences on the march, in bivouac and in battle were related, some of which were amusing as others were grave and thrilling. Mr. Fullerton's war lectures are evidently growing in interest as the course proceeds and the remaining evenings of the series will be eagerly awaited.

Father John McDonald of Kinkora was in the City yesterday. He returned by the mail special last night.

THE GUARDIAN is pleased to learn that the health of Mr. William McKinnon, Uigg, is improving. Although nearing four score years, he enjoys an unimpaired constitution. The above gentleman is the father of Mr. D. A. McKinnon, K. C. of this City.

COMPLAINT is being made that passengers on the mainland are unable to learn of the movements of the Steamers Minto and Stanley. Apparently the grievance has existed long enough and why a remedy is not made is more than those who are interested can understand.

Dr. R. McNeill who is an important witness in the case of Dr. A. C. McIntosh, which is being disposed of during the present session of the Supreme Court at Georgetown, received his subpoena too late to catch the eastbound train, yesterday afternoon compelling him to drive. He expects to return to-day.

Mr. E. S. McPhail, Secretary to the Chief Superintendent of Education has resigned to take a more lucrative position at Ottawa in either the department of Agriculture or the Fishery department. He will leave on Thursday afternoon. His family will not move to Ottawa until next fall. Mr. McPhail's successor has not yet been appointed.

It is understood that the Provincial Government has decided to purchase a blood horse for the Island and have accordingly instructed Mr. John Richards at present in England, to enquire and report with respect to the procuring of a suitable animal. The Minister of Agriculture will also purchase a Shorthorn Bull of the best breed, for the improvement of the Island stock. Mr. Rogers will likely be in Ottawa, on March 6th, when a sale of pure bred live stock will be held.
