## TANGO IS BANNED BY THE KAISER

BERLIN, November 24.—The tango, the two-step and the one-step have been officially forbidden by the Kaiser to all officers of the German army and navy when in uniform. The decree sent to all commanding officers, reads, according to the Berliner Salon:

"Officers in the army and navy are hereby requested to dance neither the tango nor the one step nor the two-step in uniform, and to avoid families where these are danced."

The Berliner Salon asserts that dismissal will be the punishment for infringement of this order.  
The Kaiser's edict, if correctly reported will upset the arrangements of the majority of Berlin hostesses, who have accepted the tango. Almost the first society function of the season was a tango tea given in the official apartments of Countess Scherwin in the Prussian houses of parliament. It was attended by the American ambassador and many young military officers.

Some young women who were to attend a course of tango lessons with German lieutenants were informed today that the officers had cancelled the arrangements, as they had received an intimation that their efforts to learn the tango would be regarded with disfavor.

### QUEBEC VILLAGE HIT BY FIRE

QUEBEC, November, 24.—St. Marie, county of Beauce, suffered a heavy loss by fire which started on Friday night, thirty-nine buildings being destroyed in the central part of the village. The village possesses no fire fighting apparatus. As it appeared the whole village would fall a prey to the flames, a telephone message was sent to Levis 37 miles distant, for assistance. Mayor Bernier, at once dispatched a section of the fire brigade and a steam fire engine.

The firemen took a position at the head of the main street, where they made a good fight, finally preventing the fire from progressing in that direction. In the meantime citizens were fighting the flames and pulling down buildings to prevent the fire extending in the other

## LORD HARDINGE RESIGNS SHORTLY

BOMBAY, Nov. 25.—That Lord Hardinge, Viceroy of India, had decided to resign at the first of the new year was reported persistently in Government circles today.

It is regarded as probable that Lord Kitchener, the present British ruler in Egypt, will be appointed to succeed Lord Hardinge.

A strong revolutionary spirit among the Indians has developed within the past two years, and the government regards the situation as one requiring a strong man. A number of men are now under arrest at Calcutta as the result of the discovery of a bomb factory.

CANADA STILL FIGURING AT HORSE SHOW.

NEW YORK, November 24.—Canadian horses figured prominently at last night's session of the horse show, when the Sifton entries cleared the boards in the high jump, and three Canadian horses got third place in the contest for three officers of each nationality.

Sky Scrapper, the Sifton entry, admirably ridden by Jack Hamilton, established a new record for Madison Square Garden, by clearing seven feet, three inches, in an exhibition jump, after the contest had been decided. Hamilton also rode the other two Sifton entries, Confidence and The Wasp, and he was disappointed in the failure of Confidence to equal his record made at Ottawa.

France won the American cup, presented by G. K. G. Billings, for the three horses, ridden by officers of the same nationality. England came second, with Harmony, Surprise and Dan Leno, ridden by Colonel P. A. Kenna, V. C., Major M. F. MacTaggart, and Capt. B. M. Stewart. Richardson, while Canada took third place, with Sky Scrapper, Dandy and Bad Girl, ridden by Captain J. W. Sifton, Major Douglas Young and Captain W. H. Bell.

### THE WHITE HOUSE BRIDE'S TROUSSEAU

Selecting a small gray tannish-sherbet hat, Miss Jessie Wilson, the White House bride-to-be, was the centre of the curious eyes of many Washington shoppers on F. street this week.

She wore a simple one piece dress of blue, with a low collar and a black velvet hat, wreathed with a mixed green and black plume. Her light hair was drawn into a low knot, without waves, at the nape of the neck. She was accompanied by her mother, and both were apparently oblivious of the glances of the curious shoppers.

When adjusted to the head of her daughter, Mrs. Wilson said the hat was very pretty and becoming. The brim of silver lace, somewhat extended in the back. The crown is of velvet and tiny French flowers, blended in several shades are grouped at intervals about it. Only her mother accompanied Miss Wilson upon the trip.

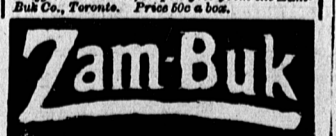
