Late Market News

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, April 11 (Produce)—Potato prices which have advanced substantially on the Montreal produce market recently, were again higher today. New Brunswick green mountains advancing to \$2.10 to \$2.25 and Quebec's at \$1.90 per 90 lbs. in bulk, in carlots. Heavy buying by United States interests was causing the upward trend in prices, dealers stated, buyers south of the line having turned to the Canadian market for supplies due to a shortage in the United States. A shade better feeling became evident on the butter market. Quotations, however, remained on the low side, the market for New Zealand butter on spot ranging from 30 1/2 to 31c per pound. Prices to the retail trade were unchanged. Included in the day's receipts of 1,328 boxes were 1,000 boxes from New Zealand, landed recently by S. S. Herminius at Halifax. Receipts of Canadian made butter were slowly increasing and would soon be an important factor on the market, dealers pointed out. Cheese receipts were 28 boxes. The market was unchanged. Egg receipts continued plentiful, 3,268 boxes arriving today, prices ruled steady.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 11 (Eggs)—There is a firmer undertone evident in Canadian egg markets today and paying prices to country shippers at Toronto have been advanced one cent.

TORONTO—A keen demand has resulted in a firmer market here. Brokers report sales of Ontario graded eggs at extras 31, firsts 29, seconds 26, delivered. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 28-29, firsts 26-27, seconds 23-24, delivered. Prices to retailers are extras 33, firsts 31-32, seconds 28, with jobbing prices one cent less.

MONTREAL—Receipts of eggs here yesterday were 3,366 cases as compared to 3,400 cases on the corresponding day a year ago. The market is holding steady and unchanged with local receipts lighter.

Central Guardian New District Supt. Appointed For C. N. Telegraphs

J. Sullivan, for the last five years, district superintendent for the Canadian National Telegraphs at Edmonton, Alberta, was installed as superintendent of the Saint John District of the system, yesterday by J. F. McTaggart, of Toronto, general superintendent, who arrived here on Tuesday with Mr. Sullivan. J. A. Barber, son of the general manager of the system, who has been superintendent of this district since the retirement of C. W. McKee, a few months ago, will go to Toronto to take over other duties there.

Speaking of their business in the Maritimes, since the taking over of the Western Union holdings by the Canadian National Telegraphs, Mr. McTaggart declared that the Maritime section of the system was a corner, and warranted its addition, a telegraph system that now stretches across the Dominion.

Mr. Sullivan, he said, had been with the company for many years, and for the last nine years had been a superintendent in charge of the districts of Winnipeg and Edmonton, and that he had proven most successful where ever he had been placed.

Mr. Sullivan started his career in 1906 with the Great Northwestern Telegraph Company, in Toronto, as messenger boy, and quickly won promotion, working his way up through the operating, inspection and commercial branches of the company, which had given him a varied experience, helpful in carrying out his present duties as a superintendent.

In April, 1921, shortly after the Great North Western Company was taken over by the Canadian National Telegraphs, Mr. Sullivan was transferred from Toronto to Winnipeg to take over the superintendency of the district there for the Canadian National. After successful service of four years in Winnipeg he was again transferred to Alberta, to become district superintendent of the Edmonton district, where he had served for the last five years.

Mr. McTaggart will leave today for a further inspection of Maritime offices of the system before returning to Toronto.
