Two New Marks Set by Skaters. EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 28 - Everett McGowan, of St. Paul, Minn., broke the world's outdoor record for the fifty-yard dash from morning start at Borden Park when he covered the distance in 3 3/8 seconds. The course was measured by the city engineer and the timers were three governors of the Alberta branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, while Jack Buchanan, athletic coach at the University of Alberta, acted as starter. McGowan also made a three at attempt on the hundred yard record, established by Joe Jewstraw last week, by running the distance in 1 1/2 of the required time. The speed trials were in connection with the Edmonton winter carnival.

McLennan's Record. PITTSFIELD, Mass., Jan. 29 - Bobby McLennan of Chicago, professional, broke the world's record for skating seventy-five yards in the first afternoon going the distance in 7 1/5 seconds. The trial was against time. The former record of 8 1/5 seconds was made by Morris Wood, amateur, at Verona, Lake, N. J., Jan. 24, 1903.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Jan. 31 - Mount Mates, near Mount Shus bald and Puyuff, which were recently in a large volume of smoke, emitting a wireless message according to here from the lower Alaska Peninsula. JACK FROST IN CALIFORNIA. California is the most wonderful country in the world for fruit, but even there occasional frosts occur at night and lead to much disaster among the orange groves. Fruit growers and engineers have long been trying to find some practical system of frost prevention, and it is believed that this has now been achieved. A central heating furnace is installed in the orchard, and by oil under pressure from a tank. A motor of about thirty horse-power draws air into a heating chamber, and when it has become hot pumps it out through distributing pipes of concrete to various points all over the orchard. When the air leaves the pipes its temperature is approximately 400 degrees Fahrenheit, and it displaces the cold air to a height of ten feet in about fifteen minutes. The main delivery pipes are underground and in summer the distributing caps and other parts above ground are removed till winter. Experts say the scheme is worth a try.
