ROUMANIAN TROOPS POUR INTO BULGARIA

Pontoon Bridge was not Destroyed as Germans Reported. Dobrudja Battle Increases in Violence. Six Bulgar Villages Captured.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) SOFIA, Oct. 4.—(Via London, Oct. 6)—Bulgarian troops from the fortress of Rustchuk and Turtukac, attacked the Roumanian forces of some sixteen battalions, which recently crossed the Danube, into Bulgarian territory near Rahovo, the war office announced today.

In the region of the river Larabun, west of Kalkit Tchivlake our advanced posts broke through the Turkish advanced guard...

Transport Sunk 12 Drowned

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Oct. 5.—The admiralty announces that the Canadian steamer Franconia, employed for transport work, was sunk in the Mediterranean yesterday, by an enemy submarine. The steamer is said to have had troops aboard, 12 of the crew of 502 are missing. The Franconia was of 1,100 tons gross register, and was built in 1910.

Italians Have Landed In South Albania

(Special to the Guardian.) NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The Journal has the following from Rome: "Italian troops landed in southern Albania where they have occupied two cities and are progressing eastward, menacing the right flank of the Bulgarian forces in western Macedonia. It was officially announced here today, that Italian forces landed at Santa Quaranta about 45 miles southwest of the extreme right Bulgarian line and 87 miles southwest of Monastir. They pushed forward on the railroad running northeast from Santa Quaranta, occupying Delvinor and then occupied Ergerio north of Delvinor."

Sent Submarines To English Channel

(Canadian Press Despatch.) NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The New York World this morning publishes the following special cable from London dated October 5: "Although the fact is not generally known in England, nothing having been mentioned by any of the newspapers, the Germans last week sent all available submarines to the English Channel."

French Continue Progress Eastward

(Special to the Guardian.) PARIS, Oct. 5.—A French official communication issued this evening says: "North of the Somme we continued our progress eastward to Morval. We repulsed counter attacks on our newly conquered trench north of Fregicourt south of the Somme. The enemy's artillery continued to display great activity particularly in Barleux, Bellery, Deincourt. In the Wyvre we captured the first fire military station where great movements of troops have been reported and caused a large fire. On the remainder of the front there is nothing to report."

Russian Steamer Has Been Sunk

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Oct. 5.—Lloyd's report that the Russian steamer Tourgal, 4287 tons gross, has been sunk. The Tourgal sailed from New York Sept. 15 for Archangel. She was formerly the British steamer Santa Brigida.

Swedan's Neutrality Is Suspected

LONDON, Oct. 4.—The relations between Sweden and the Entente Powers are attracting unusual attention here and there is every indication that the situation threatens to become acute. With the dispute as to mail seizures still unsettled there has now arisen the charge by the Allies that the neutrality of Sweden is not so loyal and important as it should be.

Vancouver, B.C., Visitor In Charlottetown
