The visitors went on the ice with a one goal lead as a result of their victory in the Island capital last night, but this advantage only lasted one minute after the opening of the first period, when Banks, star centre man for the home team, went through for the first score. MacDonald evened the count a minute later on a solo rush that was the prettiest of the evening.

Frank Doucette put the game on skids about midway through the period when he slammed one past Wilson from a scrimmage in front of the net; and Nicholson clinched matters by slamming in Campbell's rebound within a minute after the start of the first period.

The Rovers came up within striking distance of victory one minute after the beginning of the second period, when Banks went through again and scored a mixup. This was the last count of the game, although the Rovers threatened at times, and confined play to the visitors' territory. They could not solve the baffling defence of the Vics, and Dillon, guardian of the Islanders' nets, was a veritable stone wall, the outstanding star of the game.

The victors trotted out one of the youngest hockey teams that has been seen here, but they played better hockey and seemed to adapt themselves to the soft ice better than the home team, who although having a decided advantage in weight failed to take advantage of it, and passed up their chances to keep in the play-offs.

Al Doucette, youthful centre player of the Vics, turned in a star game and was one of the hardest men to watch on the ice, but to MacDonald and Campbell, the two advantage men, must go a large share of credit for their team's victory.

These two men bore the brunt of the attack throughout and for the most part kept the Rovers out of the danger zone.
