mediately around the base. Two subsequent applications should be made at intervals of ten days, making three treatments in all. It is very important to get the first application on early, as the success of the control depends very largely upon this point. In the case of radishes the solution should be poured over the young plants about 3 days after they appear above the ground and a second application made a week later. Do not treat the radishes when they are nearly ready to use as the practice is dangerous. In view of the fact that corrosive sublimate is a very deadly poison to humans and animals great care should be exercised in its use. **Control Of The Cabbage Maggot**  
The Director of Publicity, Dominion Department of Agriculture, OTTAWA

Now is the time to take precautions against the Cabbage maggot which attacks such plants as cabbages, cauliflowers and radishes. The flies are on the wing at the present time and are already laying their eggs on the stems of these plants. To save your crop control measures must be put in practice at once. Experimental work carried on over a series of years has proved that these insects can be best controlled by the use of corrosive sublimate. This material can be secured at your local seed houses and when used is diluted at the rate of one ounce to 16 gallons. As corrosive sublimate loses much of its strength when brought in contact with metals it should be mixed in and applied from glass or earthenware or wooden vessels. This point is very important. Two or three days after the cabbage or cauliflower plants have been set out in the field the solution should be poured over the stem and round the base of each plant, using about half a cupful per plant. Care should be taken to wet the stems thoroughly, as well as the stems im-
