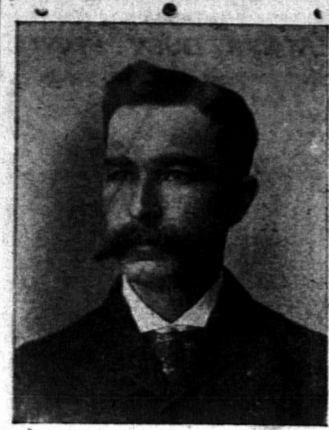

LONDON'S NEW TUBE LINES.

Thirty Miles of New Tunnels Soon to be Completed and Opened—Twopence Will be the Uniform Fare.

The electrification of the Metropolitan and Metropolitan District and the construction of the new tubular railways are progressing so favorably that it is confidently expected that the electrically equipped undergrounds will be in operation early next year, while twelve months from then the Baker Street and Waterloo, and the Great Northern, Piccadilly and Brompton divisions of the Underground Electric Railways will be ready for passengers. The completion of the Charing Cross, Euston and Hampstead line will follow shortly, as 65 per cent. of the running tunnels, and nearly half of the station tunnels, of this line, are finished. This work has been going on quietly and without the slightest interruption of traffic. No thoroughfares have been torn up and business dislocated, as in New York during the building of the subway.

One Hundred Miles.

The tubes in course of construction by the company of which Charles T. Yerkes is chairman and Edgar Speyer, of Speyer Bros., is the financier, will aggregate nearly 30 miles, and will form the greatest work of public utility ever planned and carried out for the metropolis. To this new mileage will be linked the District Railway, with its joint ownership and running powers over the Metropolitan and the growing system of electric tramways which extend in various directions westward, and which enter London at its two great modern gateways at Shepherd's Bush and Hammersmith. The total length of line under control of the Underground Electric will be over 100 miles, while the capital cost will amount to sixteen million sterling. The new accommodation thus afforded will not be far short of four hundred millions of passengers per annum for the railways and two hundred millions for the tramways, when the system, as planned and authorized, is finished.

Many New Stations.

London will, moreover, be furnished with 52 new stations. Thirty of the new stations will be in the most congested districts. The most important features are, of course, the three north and south lines, which have been greatly needed. The fare, it is understood, will be uniform at 2d., and the time saved in getting from one part of London to another and from London out into the country will amount to the saving of millions of pounds sterling to the public. The whole of this large system of tubes and undergrounds will be operated and propelled by a power house which has been erected on the banks of the Thames at Chelmsford, and which is the largest works of the kind in the Kingdom. From this station go forth 64 cables, each with 11,000 volts of electricity, to Earl's Court, where a sub-station distributes the power, so that it may be taken here and there over the entire system, and used in quantity as required. From the controlling board of the power house the operation of trains in the further sections is managed as easily as a telephone switch-board. The arrangement of the power house is likewise automatic.

Composition in Courses.

Southey was a methodical and rapid literary craftsman. "I am a quiet, patient, easy going hack of the mule breed, regular as clockwork in my pace, sure footed, bearing the burden which is laid on me, and only obstinate in choosing my own path," he wrote to a friend. But his method was by no means simple. He was a poet, a historian, a critic and a miscellaneous writer. He turned out an enormous quantity of matter and succeeded in doing so by working fourteen hours a day and diversifying his labors within his daily round. He had six tables in his library. He wrote poetry at one, history at another, criticism at a third, and so on with the other subjects upon which he was engaged, and when he was tired of spinning his brains into verse he turned to history and criticism. There is a story that he once described to Mme. de Staël the division of his time—two hours before breakfast for history, two hours for reading after, two hours for the composition of poetry, two hours for criticism, and so on through all his working day. "And pray, Mr. Southey," queried the Frenchwoman somewhat unkindly, "when do you think?"—Cornhill Magazine.

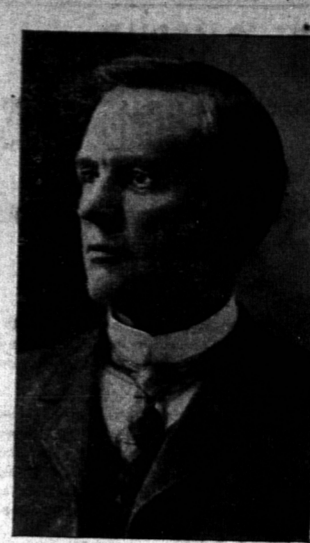

Women Barbers in India.

In India, where a man's trade is almost always determined by that of his father, the village barbers form a class apart. They always marry in caste; their wives, like themselves are descended from countless generations of barbers.

These women shave and cut hair as skillfully as their husbands, fathers and brothers. Most customers steer clear of them, however, for they have a way of leaving men whom they do not like half-shaved, and then driving them through the streets of the village with jeers and mockery. It is a terrible disgrace to an Indian to be seen only half shaved. The poor villager covers his face with his turban and goes home filled with sorrow and shame.

The barber's wives are most in request as nurses, and are useful in attending sick children. When children suffer from any kind of throat complaint, such as bronchitis or a cough, the barber's wife can be depended upon to cure it. She rubs the child's throat with some mixture made of herbs, applying it with her fingers. It is a rough treatment, but singularly efficacious.

The barber's wife has regular customers in all the Brahmin widows of the village, who must have their heads shaved twice a month or so, in token of their mourning. Her mother or widow sister of a barber always takes up the profession of midwife. Very frequently she is an angel of death in that capacity, being both cruel and ignorant. Medical missions and zemana work are, however, driving her out of business nowadays in many parts of India.

A Famous Whistle.

In the train of Anne of Denmark when she went to Scotland with James VI., was a gigantic Dane of matchless drinking capacity. He possessed an ebony whistle, which at the beginning of a drunken bout he would lay on the table, and whoever was the last able to blow it was by general consent considered to be the "champion of the whistle." It happened, however, that during his stay in Scotland the Dane was defeated by Sir Robert Laurie of Maxwellton, who after three days and three nights of hard drinking left the Dane under the table and "blew on the whistle his requiem shrill." The whistle remained in the family for many years, and the last person who carried it off was Alexander Ferguson of Craig-Darroch, son of Annie Laurie, so well and musically known. Bobbie Burns immortalized the subject in a poem entitled "The Whistle."

Cure in Horses.
