

TRAGEDY BREAKS IN ON WEDDING FESTIVITIES

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—To have their joy and gaiety turned to grief of the deepest kind, was the experience of Mr. and Mrs. Nunzio Liberty, 195 Liberty street, Hull, when in the midst of a wedding celebration they received the sad news that their two sons, Angelo, aged 15, and Michael, 12, had met death on the waters of the Ottawa River.

At 9 o'clock in the morning their daughter Josephine was married. At one o'clock in the afternoon, the two boys departed for Ottawa to get their papers for the afternoon's sale. Angelo Liberty, a cousin, aged 12, went with them, also Harvey Gauthier, a chum of the lads.

Upon their arrival in Ottawa the Liberty's suggested that they go for a swim. Going below the locks the boys went in and were apparently having a great time when Michael Liberty, the youngest lad, cried for help.


His brother, Angelo, plunged in immediately to his assistance, but the drowning brother pulled him under, and both perished.

Alarmed by what had happened the two boys ran for aid when Constable Esa Booth, of Ottawa police force, appeared on the scene and immediately began diving for the bodies. He was successful after a short time in recovering both bodies.

Dr. Wood was summoned, and worked an hour on the bodies without success.

The Gauthier boy stated that he was unable to swim much, and so was prevented from being of assistance.

According to parents of the boys, who are almost frantic with grief, it was unusual for them to go in swimming and they are at a loss to account for their actions. Mr. and Mrs. Liberty conduct a fruit and candy store on Champlain avenue, Hull, and have lived in this country ten years.
