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Englands Own Music Enshriend By Hadou

(Canadian Press)

LONDON, August 7.—English musicians must be glad to see their art enshrined in company with 'Shakespeare.' The English Public School, 'Cricket,' and other matters which are part and parcel of our national inheritance, says the Times in connection with Sir Henry Hadow's recent addition of 'English Music' to the series of little books with the collective title of 'The English Heritage Series,' including the books mentioned.

But the first cause is the fact that music is included at all, because that in itself is acknowledgment that music holds, and has always held, a place among the lively interests of the people, and that their interest in the practice of music has produced types different from the music of other nations.

It means that in music we have something that we take for granted as our own, that just as our speech is colored by familiar quotations from Shakespeare, our manners, even to the trivialities of dress by those of the Public school, and our views on sportsmanship by the very word 'cricket' so there is something in English music which informs and limits our outlook on the art as a whole.

In so far as a national tradition is a limiting factor in popular taste it is not always welcome to the eager musician. How often do our musical leaders rebuke us sternly for not having adopted the admirable institutions of the Continent for the diffusion of artistic cultivation, such things, for example, as municipal opera houses in every one of the great cities.

On the other hand, in the sensibilities of the community are suddenly touched to sympathy with an artist of foreign origin, when English people hail a Handel or a Mendelssohn, finding some quality in his work which seems peculiarly congenial to their traditions and aspirations, they are liable to be whipped off and told, in the words of Professor Trevelyan, that 'Nothing is more striking than the inability of the English to stand by their native traditions in art.' The question is raised as to what constitutes the English heritage in music.

Sir Henry Hadow's answer is clear. For him the English heritage is the good music made by English men, and by Englishmen he means, strictly the holders of British birth certificates. By this definition Handel is ruled out and Frederic Delius is ruled in, though only just in. The ruling shows where this definition fails. Normally it meets the case well enough, and the most exhilarating thing in Sir Henry Hadow's well-told tale is that not only does he glory in the achievements of the masters past and present, but he is well assured that in doing so he is speaking for us all, learned and unlearned alike.

Sir William Henry Hadow is one of Great Britain's noted educationists and authors, and holds honorary degrees of several universities. He is honorary doctor of music, of Durham and Wales.

BELLED BUZZARDS TO FLOAT OVER OHIO

LANCASTER, O., Aug. 6.—(U.P.)—A buzzard which soared and dipped to the tinkle of a small bell around its neck became a legend in Fairfield County. It disappeared and news came that an Indiana farmer had killed the "belled" bird.

Now three Lancaster boys propose to restore the "belled" buzzard to the county's list of unusual phenomena. The boys trapped two mated buzzards, placed bells around their necks and released them. They then discovered a buzzard nest with four young buzzards which they are guarding and will "bell" before the birds are old enough to fly away.

PROFESSOR'S SPECIMENS PRESERVED IN WATERS

MARIETTA, O., Aug. 6.—(U.P.)—Professor H. R. Eggleston, Marietta college biologist, recently went about the business of putting a collection of preserved snakes and beetles in new containers. When the task was completed, Professor Eggleston was the owner of five gallons of an extinct species of American whiskeys.

The specimens were put up in 1849. It was liquor more than 80 years old.

The professor said he had attributed the peculiar color of the preserving fluid to disintegration because of extreme age of the specimens.

"I have read old biological reports in which field men requisitioned a keg of whiskey for preservative, since it was cheaper than alcohol then," the professor said, "but until now I had been skeptical about the contents of these kegs."

TRIBUTE TO CANADIAN WOMAN LEADER

EDMONTON, Alta., Aug. 6.—Commenting on the death of Mrs. Louise McKinney, first woman to be elected to a legislative body in the Empire. The Edmonton Journal said editorially:

"It was a great distinction that came to Mrs. McKinney, the announcement of whose death caused widespread regret. She was not only the first woman to occupy a seat in the Alberta house but the first in any British legislative body. For public affairs she had great aptitude and the impression that she made on the life of this province was a strong one. Both before and after her election as member for Claresholm, to which constituency she came with her husband nearly 30 years ago, her activities were many and varied. There has been no more earnest and able advocate of the cause of temperance in Canada. She recently became acting president of the dominion W. C. T. U. and was a vice president of the world organization.

"The steps that were recently taken to have Mrs. McKinney's portrait painted and placed in the legislative buildings met with a large response. While it is most unfortunate that the work was not undertaken soon enough to allow it to be completed before her death, there should be no doubt about the portraits being included among those that recall the outstanding figures in the province's political history."

WIFE DESERTION COMMON IN QUEEN CITY

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 6.—An average of 72 cases of wife desertion a week in Toronto come to the attention of the Family Court, it is stated by this department of justice.

On an average 12 husbands leave their homes and their wives every day in this city.

But that does not mean that their responsibility ends there. To walk out of duty is not to enter the flowery path of no obligations. There are bills to pay and there are other accounts to settle. Before long, owing to a humane and sympathetic system of inquiry, adjustment and mediation, 90 per cent. of the wife-and children deserters are back home and assuming parental responsibilities and normal family life is re-established.

Money enters largely into the family upheavals which come to the attention of the court. Many of these are settled on occurrences, which means that the parties concerned meet in one of the private rooms of the court department where experience in making such social adjustments. There is no publicity in the Toronto Family Court. Every chance is given a father or a mother to rebuild or to remake home harmony without any airing of domestic troubles. That 90 per cent. do is ample evidence for the effectiveness of the plan and justification for the existence of such a social aid.

Lack of employment and the difficult economic situation has not appreciably affected the rise in the number of family desertions. Cases of wife-desertion in the hope of gaining mothers' pensions for a family are not frequent. A period of three years must be tided over by the mother before she can obtain this assistance in raising her family.

TORONTO A CITY OF HOMES

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—That Toronto still maintains her designation as "the city of homes" is shown by permits granted for 60 undertakings at a cost of \$303,000. A contract has been awarded for a brick and steel addition to Wymwood, the Women's Union Building in connection with Victoria College, to cost around \$10,000. The plans call for more than doubling the cafeteria capacity. Other work planned is to increase accommodation of the girl students in houses at 113 to 147 Bloor Street, owned by the college.

Chagrined no doubt, at Washington's audacity in cutting his team's lead to a mere ten games, Manager Mack yesterday called upon his two strong arm boys, Lefty Grove and George Earnshaw, to go out there and quiet the Senators once and for all. Lefty and George did just that, the southpaw taking the first frame for his 22nd victory of the season, and the right-hander the second.

The Athletics made three home runs, Simmons, Fox and Todd getting one each.

WELL PLEASED

Bill McKenchie is pretty well pleased to date with Urbanski and the Boston manager maintains that it looks like Maraville's first year instead of his last. McKenchie is the current sensation among managers, and it is stated by expert baseball men that he will wind up with a pennant in a few years for the Braves. With major league races practically decided experts are working on obituaries for managers like Robinson of Brooklyn, Howley at Cincinnati, Harris at Detroit, and even Hornsby with the Cubs is believed to be due to walk the plank. There is little sentiment in baseball. You have to get a winner or a near winner, otherwise your services are not in demand.

EASY FOR MAX

Maxie Rosenbloom rushed into the Brooklyn Ball Park Wednesday, like a circus performer keeping an engagement on short notice, and scrambled through fifteen acrobatic rounds with Jimmy Slattery to keep his hold on the world's light heavyweight boxing championship.

Although apparently in a hurry to go places and see things, Rosenbloom went the limit and "slapped" out a decisive victory over the Buffalo Irishman.

The champion received the unanimous verdict of Referee Kid McPartland and the two judges after 15 monotonous rounds of cuffing and clinging. There was not the slightest semblance of a knockdown punch in the hands of either boxer and little action calculated to stir the enthusiasm of one of the smallest turnouts for any title fight in New York in years.

Very Small Gate

Less than 10,000 cash customers and perhaps not more than 5,000 gave the big field a semi-deserted appearance.

The gate receipts were estimated at not more than \$35,000, a far cry from the battle for the same title between Berlenbach and Delaney in 1926, that drew close to half a million dollars.

Rosenbloom won by a wide margin and received the unanimous decision of Referee Kid McPartland and the two judges. Slattery made a brisk finish but was decisively out-pointed.
