## Jugo-Slav Troops Causing Trouble

(Special to The Guardian). VIENNA, May 3.—Seventeen thousand Jugo-Slav troops Monday night attacked Carinthian troops numbering 4000 in the sectors of Arnoldstein in the Villach-Rosebach and Rainof and passed the demarcation line fixed by the armistice commission of six miles. The Jugo-Slavs on Wednesday crossed the Drav River at several points and cut the line to Arnoldstein and Klagenfurt, preventing communication by German Austria and Italy.
