WESTERN STATES WANT ST. LAWRENCE ROUTE TO OCEAN.—WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Governor Christiansen of Minnesota, has issued a call for a Great Lakes-St. Lawrence tidewater conference to be held January 5 and 6 in St. Paul. Arrangements for the conference are being made by the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Commission of Minnesota. Gov. Christiansen in issuing the call for the meeting, protested against the movement to postpone the development of facilities of transportation and said that such neglect of its just transportation interests the west would not tamely submit.

PLUM PUDDINGS FOR THE U. S. A.—LONDON, Dec. 4.—Thousands of English plum puddings will be crossing the Atlantic in the next few days to take their place on the American Christmas table. This year, more than ever before, the English plum pudding has been regarded with particular affection, because the New York Customs officials now look upon it as a harmless visitor. "Plum puddings or confectionery that contains wine or spirit as a flavoring are not regarded as an infringement of the prohibition law, said an official of the United States.

Liver Discovery Is London's Own.—MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—"The real cause of the slightest doubt that priority in the discovery of the liver substance that reduces blood pressure must be credited to Dr. A. A. James and physiological department of the University of Western Ontario at London, Ont.," said Dr. A. B. Macallum, professor of biochemistry at McGill University today with regard to an announcement made in Toronto on Tuesday night by Dr. W. J. Macdonald describing the discovery of the effect of a certain liver extract in the reduction of high blood pressure.

"They had already demonstrated this, I know before Dr. Macdonald went there to work in October 1924, on another problem which had a little ending in less than three weeks, during which period there Dr. Macdonald learned of the effect of this extract on blood pressure.

"The history of the affair is like what would fill a chapter of 'Arrow smith,' a novel which paints an unenviable picture of certain phases of American medical and academic life—an unenviable picture, for I believe that there are in the medical profession and in academic life in America very many representatives of noble idealism.

I hope the University of Toronto will not become involved, as it must preserve its ideals. If it does not, what is to distinguish it from the standards of the common ruck? I believe there are enough on the staff and governing body of that University to prevent it from being identified in any way with the affair.

Prince Of Wales Pays Scotland Yard Visit.—LONDON, Dec. 7.—The Prince of Wales today paid a surprise visit to Scotland Yard, where he inspected the famous "black museum" in which relics of murders, burglaries and other crimes are stored. He also witnessed various phases of the police activities.

The Prince is having a comparative rest from society, most of his official engagements having been cancelled owing to the death of his grandmother, Dowager Queen Alexandra, but he finds time hanging heavily for one of his restive nature.

He spent several mornings recently exercising his hunters in the country, but he did not join in the actual chase. When not making duty calls in London he visits all sorts of odd places.

Queen Alexandra's Will Not Be Published

LONDON, Dec. 7.—There is no likelihood of Queen Mother Alexandra's will being published or the amount of her estate revealed. King Edward's will was never published, but presumably it will now be seen what disposition he wished to be made of Sandringham, which was his personal property.

The future of Marlborough House lies with Parliament and probably the Prince of Wales will be given the first offer of it. It is understood, however, that the Prince is much more partial to his present quarters in St. James' Palace than to Marlborough House, which may fall to the Duke of York.

Marlborough House chapel shall continue in use as a place of worship for the Danish colony in London, as it has for many years past, notwithstanding the death of Queen Mother Alexandra, King George having given directions to this effect.

Services according to the Lutheran rite have been held regularly in the chapel at Queen Alexandra herself at one time frequently attended the services there.

Form Anti-Modern Woman League

BERLIN, Dec. 6.—A league against modern women has been formed in Germany by men who yearn for the old-fashioned girl.

At the inaugural meeting a resolution was passed whereby the members pledged themselves "never to marry a girl addicted to cigarette smoking."

To the more puritanical of the members this resolution seemed too mild, whereupon they moved that the league ban marriage with girls who "either smoked, drank intoxicating beverages, wore their hair bobbed or painted their lips."

Freight Traffic Shows Big Increase

(Canadian Press.)
MONCTON, Dec. 7.—Freight traffic on the Atlantic region of the Canadian National Railways is rapidly approaching the peak usually achieved only during the mid-winter rush of import and export business consequent upon the closing of the St. Lawrence route according to information given here by officials of the railway.

Within the last four days eighty-five extra freight trains have been operated on main lines of the region and the movement continues. The increase in traffic which is several weeks earlier this season, is not confined to the movement of wheat, 200,000 bushels of which have already gone to Saint John from western points and 500,000 bushels of which are on the way but is in general freight as well. Lumber, coal and potato movements showing marked increases.
