BISONS WIN FIRST GAME

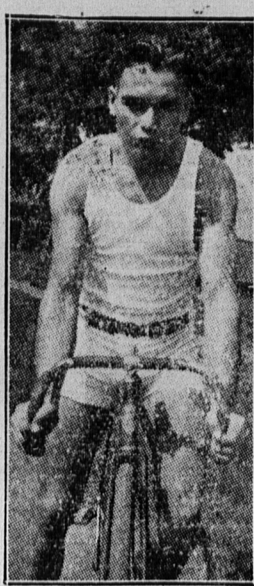

MUCH DEPENDS ON JACKSON IN SERIES

(This is the fourth of a series analyzing the Giants and Senators and their World Series prospects.)

Baseball lightning seldom may strike twice in the same place but even when it does New York Giants refuse to be discouraged. They are going into the world series with Washington for the second time, minus their regular third baseman, but none the less confident that Travis (Stonewall) Jackson will play the hero's role as a substitute.

Nine years ago, Freddy Lindstrom, then just out of a Chicago High School, stepped into the great Heinie Groh's shoes and played a brilliant game at third base against the Senators. Jackson then was rounding out his first year at shortstop for the Giants. Since then, a pair of bad knees have checked Jackson's career but the one-time "Arkansas Traveller" plans a come back as the replacement for Johnny Verges, the hard-hitting third sacker who was knocked out of the line, up by an appendix operation three weeks ago.

Suffering from Charley-Horse "Jackson's knees are all right now even though he's still a bit lame, and he will start at third for us," says Manager Bill Terry. "The only trouble with Jax since he returned to the lineup is a charley-horse and he will work himself out of that. He will come through on the defence and he will hit."

The Giants purchased some additional third base insurance when they summoned Chuck Dressen from Memphis. If Jackson is disabled, the Senators no doubt will grant Terry permission to use Dressen but the feeling among the Giants is they would rather have Jackson "on one leg" than anyone else.

Senators Have Hitting Edge

This adds a touch of drama to the infield situation but the figures and the "dope" indicate Washington will have the edge, especially at bat. Terry's 324 is the only top notch batting mark among the Giants' infield quartette. The Senators average 300 collectively and have two cleanup hitters in Manager Joe Cronin, now hitting .312, and Joe Kuhel, the young first baseman, who shows a mark of .321 in the latest unofficial averages.

Defensively, Terry and Hughey Critz, two of the first workers in the game, have a margin over Kuhel and Buddy Myer on the right side but manager Cronin at short and Ossie Bluge at third combine greater steadiness and experience than their rivals, "Blondy" Ryan and Jackson. The Giants have rattled off more double plays than the Senators, due mainly to the sensational development of Ryan as a keystone companion for the acrobatic, ground-covering Critz.

Nova Scotia Baseball Troubles Finally Cleared Up—Teams To Meet At Middleton On Tuesday

HALIFAX, Sept. 24.—Troubles that clouded Nova Scotia's baseball horizon were cleared away tonight, and Halifax Willow Parks and Yarmouth Gateways squared off again for a resumption of their semi-final series. The semi-finalists will meet Tuesday at Middleton, and the winners will fight it out with Springhill and Fenwick for the provincial crown.

Decision to wind up the much-disputed semi-final series with a sudden death match came after Springhill and Yarmouth had played two games of the final round. Springhill won the first game 7-0, but Yarmouth tied up the series at Springhill with a 5-3 victory.

If Yarmouth takes Tuesday's game, their two matches with Springhill will stand as part of the final series, but if Halifax gains the finals, the games will be classed as "exhibitions."

The ruling that cleared up the complex problem existing last week was given today by President C. C. Gillespie of the M. P. B. A. A. U. of C., after the branch executive had placed Willow Parks in the finals against the winners of the Yarmouth-Springhill series.

Local Bike Rider Is Second In Gruelling Race

Lloyd Bryanton Loses Out To Halifax Pedaller By 10 Seconds In 15 Mile Race.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 24.—Albert Boutillier, of Bedford, riding under the colors of St. Mark's, Halifax, beat Lloyd Bryanton, of Charlottetown, by 10 seconds to capture the 15 mile junior bicycle race sponsored by the Halifax Chronicle. Boutillier will be recognized as the Maritime junior bicycle champion.

Boutillier, Bryanton, MacLeod, Mitchell, Coles and Myatt put on a neck and neck battle all the way and hardly any daylight was showing between their bikes. The above six riders shot out into the lead at the gun and they staged a gruelling 15 mile battle never seen in Halifax before. MacLeod kept the lead for the greater part of the way with the other four trailing him by a few feet. At the turn, MacLeod still had the lead, Wilson, Myatt, Mitchell, Bryanton and Coles turned in the order mentioned. About one hundred yards behind the leaders another group followed led by James Britten.

St. Mark's, captained by Douglas MacLeod, won the team prize. Their riders finished first, fourth, fifth and seventh. The team was managed by Ernest Dowdy, well known bike rider of former days. MacLeod was still leading at the bottom of Fairview Hill, Boutillier, a dangerous man on the hills, pedaled his bicycle faster than the rest and by the time he came to the top of the hill he had a good lead over Lloyd Bryanton, of Charlottetown.

Finishes Fast

When Bryanton reached the summit of the hill he was about 30 seconds behind the leader. He put on a final minute spurt down to the finish and cut Boutillier's lead down to 10 seconds. Cyril Myatt, Tigers A. A. C., who won the race last year, found the competition too tough this year and finished in sixth place. Douglas MacLeod was the only rider in the race last year that finished ahead of Myatt this year, the rest all newcomers.

Out of the thirty two entered in the race, twenty eight went to the starting line and the same number completed the full distance. Willow Parks, the youngest cyclist in the race, rode in last place for a greater part of the way but passed two riders about a mile from the finish. He showed spunk and was given a big hand when he passed those older boys.

It is expected that a team of four boys will journey to Charlottetown to take part in the Holman-Pickard 10 mile classic next year. All starters and the officials were the guests at the Orpheus Theatre Saturday night through the courtesy of Fred Lausanne, manager. The prizes were presented immediately after the race by Cyril "Swifty" Robinson, local long distance swimmer. All the boys were well pleased with the awards.

PAIN BREAKS RECORDS BUT LOSES BOAT

British Speed Boat King and Mechanic Escape Injury As Boat Burns.

POOLE, Dorset, England, Sept. 23.—While knifing the water at more than 90 miles an hour, the Miss England III, Hubert Scott-Paine's motor boat which just returned from Detroit, caught fire today.

Scott-Paine and his mechanic were not injured but the former's clothes were scorched by flames from the motor.

The British speed enthusiast was trying to lower Great Britain's sea mile record and the unofficial world record for single-engined motorboats. He had made five runs over the course, returned to the pier to refuel, went out and made three more runs when flames shot from the rear of the craft.

Boat Burned Out
Dozens of motor boats carrying chemical fire extinguishers rushed to the scene. The driver and his mechanic already were fighting the flames. After half an hour's work the fire was brought under control and the Miss Britain, her engine and rear portion burned out, was towed to the pier with Scott-Paine standing on the bows, acknowledging cheers from a huge crowd which had gathered at the water front.

Before the Miss England caught fire, Scott-Paine had beaten the sea mile record formerly held by Miss Betty Carstairs and the unofficial world's record for single engined motorboats set by the late Sir Henry Seagrave.
