At Hunter River.

The teachers of Hunter River and vicinity gathered at Hunter River on Thursday, Sept. 16, with an attendance of about thirty-four.

The president, Mrs. Verma Dixon presided.

The convention opened with minutes of the convention of 1942 read by the secretary, Miss Marion Doyle.

The following committees were appointed: Press—Miss Lynetta Brown and Mrs. Reta Todd.

Mr. C. B. Jelly, supervisor in his address, stressed the importance of promptness in sending in the monthly reports. He also gave some helpful suggestions on the teaching of Geography.

Mr. Rice, supervisor, stated that he found a definite improvement in the standards of the grades last year. He congratulated the teachers on the improvement of these pupils' work, and the results of the Grade VIII exams. He stressed the importance of teaching Physical training.

Miss Mona Wilson, Public Health Nurse spoke about the work being done by the Department of Public Health and Welfare, and thanked the teachers for their splendid aid at the May and June Clinics.

Afternoon Session. At the afternoon session, the Question Box was conducted by Miss Jennie Moore, and discussion followed, led by L. H. Shaw, M. A., Director of Education. Mr. Shaw stressed the importance of the teaching profession though at times efforts seem unappreciated.

Rev. Mr. Mercer spoke on Temperance and asked the teacher's cooperation in this important work.

Mr. Mugford, Instructor of Music, expressed the hope that more rural schools would enter the Musical Festival, and offered assistance in this work. Mr. Mugford led an enjoyable sing song.

Miss Helen Yeo, B. A. gave a demonstration on teaching primary reading. Her remarks were illustrated by a film shown by Mr. Mark.

Mr. Martin spoke on Visual Aid films and showed a film on discipline.

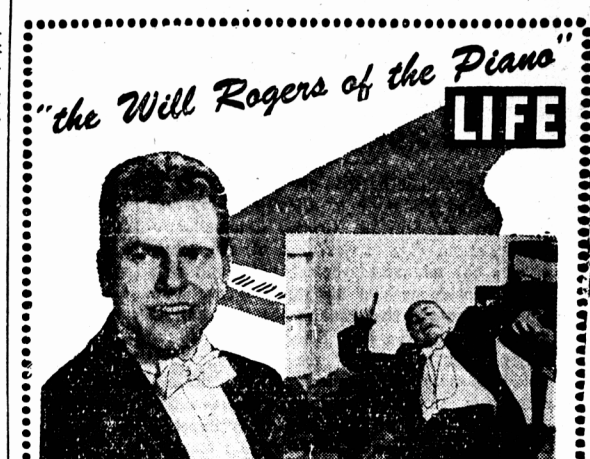
