ISLANDER DEAD.—Mr. Frank Currie, of this city, has received telegram from the Adjutant-General at Ottawa, informing him, with deep regret that his brother, Private John Currie, of the 17th and previously reported missing, is now dead, according to the German list. No particulars are given as to date, place or circumstances of his death. Some time ago word came that he was a prisoner in Germany. The deceased who was 27 years of age and unmarried, was the son of the late Donald Currie and was born in Charlottetown. When about fifteen years of age he removed to New Glasgow, N. S., where he enlisted with the 17th Battalion. Besides his brother Frank in Charlottetown, he also leaves one brother, Alexander, who is now somewhere in the firing line, having enlisted in Western Canada; a brother in the United States and one sister in Northern New Brunswick.

THE MAHARAJAH OF KAPURTHALA VISITS THE CITY

MONTREAL, Aug. 9.—His Highness the Maharajah of Kapurthala, accompanied by Her Highness the Princess of Kapurthala, Prince Karamjit, M. L. Depont, Dujon, secretary, arrived in Montreal this morning, in the private car Olympia from Toronto. The distinguished visitors drove to the Ritz-Carlton Hotel, where they will stay for two or three days, during which time they will visit places of interest in the city and neighborhood.

His Highness had an automobile drive this morning along Sherbrooke street, and then through the centre of the city in order to see the shops and business places. They carried the flags of Great Britain, France and Belgium. His Highness is much interested in art, and has expressed his intention of visiting the Art Gallery.

The party has visited the exhibition at San Francisco and San Diego, and some of the principal cities in North America. On leaving Montreal Their Highness will visit Quebec, where the Maharajah will stay a week, afterwards returning to Montreal and then going on to New York.

The Maharajah is the ruler of an Indian state, with a population of 1,000,000, and has sent men and money to the British Empire in its present struggle. His son, who was at Oxford, is a member of the staff of General Wilcox.

NO DECISIVE MILITARY EVENT

ROTTERDAM, Aug. 10.—Correspondence of Daily News.—The tone of the comment by Berlin newspapers on the fall of Warsaw has completely changed since the first announcement of the German victory. The public is now reminded that the taking of the Polish capital is no decisive military event.

The Vossische Zeitung says:—"A great stride nearer peace which still lies far distant is the capitulation of Warsaw, but no fortress, not even Paris, can longer be looked upon as the final object of the military operations."

"A new reign of peace can only flourish upon the ruin of the enemy's army in the field."

The conquered Vistula line became the springboard for the attainment of this object. The moral effect upon the troops of these two victories will help the advance upon the enemy whose defeat in a bloody battle alone will enable us to pick the final fruits of victory.

"Just as the fall of Liege and Antwerp justified no one in thinking that the war against France has been won, we must not now deceive ourselves in thinking that the taking of Warsaw and even Ivangorod is anything but the clearing away of the first of the chief obstacles with which the Russian army has surrounded itself."
