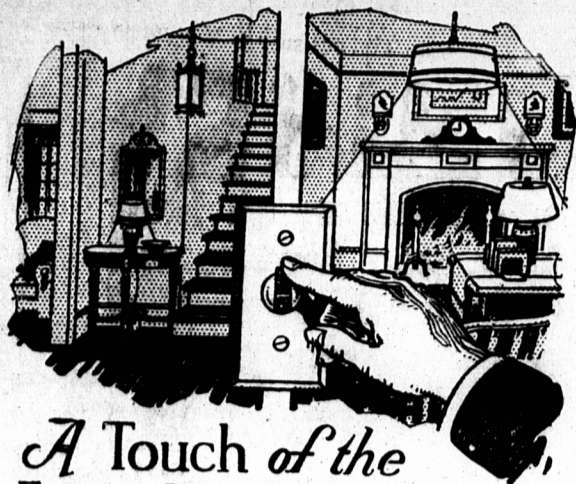

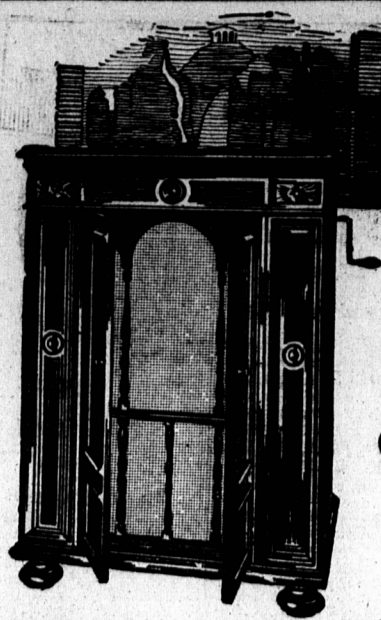

### IN MEMORIAM

MR. ROBERT L. MELLISH

Mr. Robert L. Mellish, an aged and respected resident of Union Road, Kinkora, passed away to his eternal reward on Dec. 20, 1926, at the advanced age of 81 years; after an illness of nearly two months duration, which was the end, took the form of paralysis. The funeral, which was largely attended, was held from his late home to Union Road Cemetery, Rev. J. W. Hayter, of the Christian Church, Charlottetown officiated. Rev. C. E. Armstrong being present was invited to assist. The address by Mr. Hayter was very instructive, showing that we each "are writing a book" as we live our daily lives; and pointed out the necessity of making each page so clean, as to have God's approval upon it. The hymns sung were, that good old one by Wesley, "Jesus lover of my Soul"; "Does Jesus care when my heart is pained"; and "Abide with me."

The whole service was most impressive and we hope beneficial in helping us to "write our book", so that when our turn comes and we are called hence, we will meet it with joy and not with sorrow. May we strive, with God's help, to attain to that holiness, without which, we are told, no one shall see the Lord.
