SASKATOON, Sask. Sept. 17.—Tapping soles is no longer the work of father's winter evenings, but the concern of craftsmen carefully trained to doctor the present day footgear, who earn good money, and a large class of returned soldiers are working under the direction of Mr. A. Johnson, an expert repair man. To learn the trade as a means of future livelihood.

Mr. Johnson is employed by the vocational training branch of the Military Hospitals' Commission in the Y. M. C. A. Building here, and is getting great results from the men. They are eager and quick to learn he says, and he hopes to turn out every man a finished worker capable of going into business for himself.

The men are doing machine as well as handwork, and Johnson's eagerness to do his bit for the boys leads him to give generously of his experience in running this sort of a business, hints that no text book or manual could give.

DWINDLING RESERVES CAUSING ANXIETY.

TORONTO, Ont. Sept. 14.—Under the heading "Disquieting Figures," the Globe editorially today discussing of fiscal figures of Canadian casualties and recruiting says:

"The dwindling reserves in England; fit to take the field, may not be sufficient to enable General Currie to keep further divisions in the trenches. The new drafted army to be raised in October or November will, of course, require months of training before it will be available. In the meantime will the four divisions at the front shrink to three or two?"

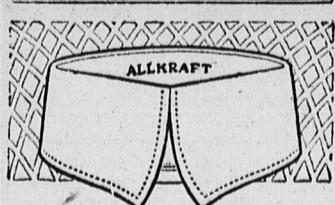

France, Aug. 23rd, 1917.
To Mr. and Mrs. Campbell and family:

My Dear Friends:—

There is very little we can do for our home folk aside from volunteering to do you bit in France. I wish to send you a few words in appreciation of your duty to your province and country in raising such a noble boy as Douglas to give his life for his country. When Douglas' draft came to our Battalion, he was put in any section as a bomber and we were together until I was wounded last February. After my return this summer we were together in the same platoon and we slept in the same bunk hole, made tea etc., and had several enjoyable talks about P. E. I., his home and friends. I found Douglas a splendid boy, of good moral character and one of the finest dispositions I have ever met. I was by Douglas the day he was killed. Death was instantaneous so you may know that no pain was suffered. I escaped with a scratch on the face and a rather severe shock in my right ear. Douglas was buried under the supervision of our chaplain next day. I send to the family—my deepest sympathies. I would like nothing better than to be able to visit the relatives of the boys who have paid the Great Sacrifice and tell them of our sojourn together in this great fight.

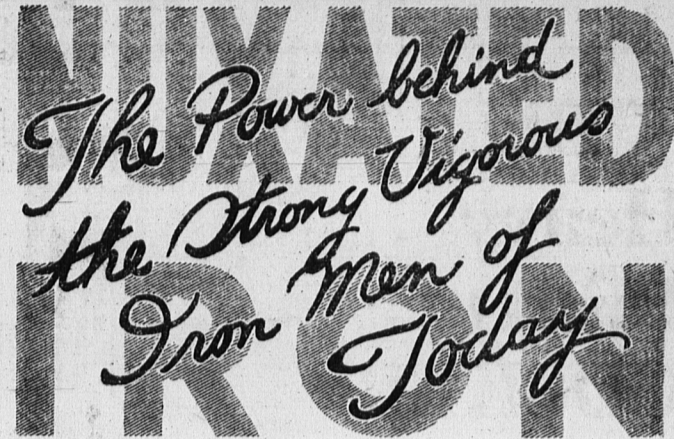

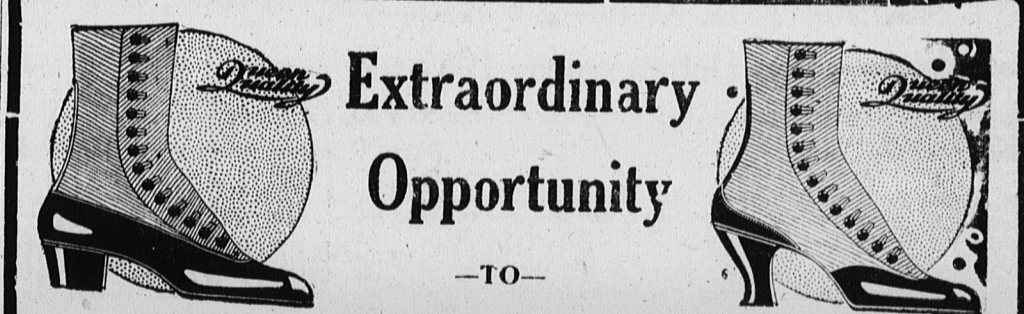
