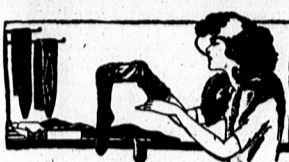

Pleading that she, a graduate of a fashionable New England finishing school, was duped into marrying Hoover, the wife created a dramatic scene in the police station when she stripped off her wedding ring, other jewellery and a turban after her husband had admitted stealing them.

While Mrs. Hoover explained that she thought her husband was a wealthy man, a graduate of Harvard and socially acceptable, until after they had been married and started on their honeymoon to Havana, Hoover declared she had known his past and even aided him in unlawful ventures.

Hoover was arrested on a charge of passing a worthless cheque at a local hotel. It was after his wife had bared his life that the man turned on her, implicating her in his work, and admitted he was wanted by the police in Montreal.

**Supposed Hold-Ups Prove Mythical**

BRANTFORD, Ont., Aug. 29.—That the alleged hold-ups reported on the Burford and Paris roads were nothing more than motorists attempting to secure aid for their disabled cars, is the discovery which has resulted from the police investigation of the reports.

Regarding the attempted hold-up on the Burford Road, High County Constable Kedd reported that an investigation had shown that it had been without foundation. The car was later brought to a city garage and repaired there.

BERLIN, Aug. 29.—The British, French and Italian ambassadors have informed Germany of the decision of their Governments to send reinforcements into Upper Silesia. Germany has been asked by the ambassadors to make the necessary arrangements for the transport of reinforcements.

**Rebels In India Bent On Mischief**

LONDON, Aug. 29.—A Reuter despatch from Calcutt, India, says the Moplah bands of insurgents are now concentrating around Tirur and Panani, apparently bent on mischief. Several thousands looted a police station and public offices at Tirur and carried off munitions. They liberated prisoners and held up seventeen policemen, whom they forced to remove their uniforms.
