Quest For Gold Is Fatal To Four
LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25 - The never-ending quest for gold in the southwest led four men to their deaths and sent six others to hospitals where they are in a serious condition. Mason Reid, 26, and Phil Pidgeon, 30, were killed in a premature dynamite blast at the Black Mountain mine near Searchlight, Nev. At the Starlight mine, near Mojave, Calif., Johnovich, 35, and John Bukovac, 31, lost their lives when overcome by poisonous gas. Six men who attempted to rescue them were overcome by the fumes.

IN MEMORIAM

JAMES ROBERT McDONALD
Mrs. Malcolm MacKenzie, Rose Valley received the sad news that her brother, James R. McDonald died suddenly of heart failure at his home in Leadville Colo. His many relatives and friends here will regret his passing. The following obituary is taken from the Leadville News.

Friends of long standing filled the Moymahon-O'Malla Mortuary chapel Friday afternoon during the funeral services for the late James R. McDonald. That he had a wide circle of friends was borne out in the numerous floral tributes, surrounding the casket.

The funeral service, in which was included a warm personal tribute, was solemnized by Mr. McDonald's nephew, Rev. John B. McDonald, pastor of the Aurora Presbyterian church.

Three duets "Abide With Me", "God Knows Best" and "We'll Never Say Good-Bye" were sweetly and solemnly rendered by Messdames C. C. Phillips and F. E. Brown, accompanied by Mrs. Ted Lane.

At the conclusion of the service interment took place at St. Joseph's cemetery, where Mr. McDonald's remains were laid to rest beside his deceased wife and son. Pallbearers were William Elliot, Patrick Roche, Charles E. Slavin, John Griffin, Joseph Dewar and Joseph Boland.

James McDonald had a reputation for being one of the most expert miners ever to set foot in Leadville. During his thirty-year career in every mine and property in the district and had been employed also at Climax and in the Alma district. His last employment, prior to his death, was at the Mt. Champion mine in Half Moon gulch, now being operated by John Cortellini.

Mr. McDonald was born at Rose Valley, Prince Edward Island, Canada, March 13, 1881. His parents were Murdoch and Janet McDonald. In March, 1900, he came to Leadville to join his brothers, Daniel J. and Hector, both of whom had come here a short time previous.

In August, 1903, he was married to Margaret Golden and the couple were the parents of three sons, one of whom, Russell, died in infancy. His wife died in 1919 and since that time his sister-in-law, Kate Golden, has made a home for him and helped him rear his two surviving sons, Elmer and Robert.

During the term of office of Mayor Rose, when his brother, Daniel, was Alderman, James McDonald held the office of City Marshall from 1907 to 1909.

He had been a member of Silver Camp No. 12, Woodmen of the World, and the local Yeoman lodge for a number of years.

Surviving him in addition to his sons, Elmer and Robert, are a granddaughter, Joann, daughter of Elmer and his wife; two sisters, Mrs. M. McKenzie, who is living at the old family home in Prince Edward Island, Canada and Mrs. Albert McArthur of Bangor, Prince Edward Island, and his son, Rev. J. B. McDonald, came from Denver for the funeral; his sister-in-law, Miss Kate Golden and nieces and nephews.

Trio of Plays With One Show Coward's Idea

MANCHESTER, England, Sept. 24 - A new idea in the theatre will be introduced by Noel Coward, playwright and actor, at the Manchester Opera House beginning Oct. 16, when he will appear with Miss Gertrude Lawrence in a new production entitled "Tonight at 8.30."

Mr. Coward has varying in length from one to seven scenes, and three of them will be presented each evening. It is probable that a further three new plays will be completed shortly making nine in all. Each evening or afternoon program will consist of one serious play, one comedy, and one musical production.

The whole of the plays and the music will be of Mr. Coward's authorship, and all of them will be accompanied by a full orchestra. All the plays will be of short duration, but it is pointed out that they are not one-act plays in the accepted sense. They will vary in length from 40 to 60 minutes each.

Mr. Coward believes that it is a disadvantage that actors and actresses should be called on to perform the same play for months on end. The repertory system, he thinks, is more effective because it keeps the players fresh and gives the public a wider range of entertainment. He has always disliked long runs. It will be remembered he set a limit to the length of run of his "Private Lives" and also of his own personal engagement in "Conversation Piece."

LOON LAKE Sask., Sept. 25 - The happiest little girl in this new Northern Saskatchewan town tonight was Amelia Bender. The three-year-old tot, snug in a hospital bed, was rapidly recovering from an enforced three-day diet of wild berries while lost in the tangled brush country near her home.

Visiting playmates looked with envy at the goodies that lay on a table near her cot while Amelia, clutching a rag doll, responded to treatment and heard the nurses say she would soon be well again.

More than 250 persons, including scouts and Indian trackers, engaged in the search for the little wanderer who became lost near her Good-soll farm last Monday. She had left home to meet some school friends.

Unaware of a surprise visit, Amelia's playmates had taken a different route homeward. The child wandered about in the thick underbrush for three days until found by one of the Indian trackers.

She lay face down, in a semi-conscious condition. Rushed to hospital here, she rapidly responded to treatment.

Lady Watson, Poets Widow Seeks Work
ROTTINGDEAN Sussex, Sept. 25 - Lady Watson, widow of Sir William Watson, the poet, who died in a nursing home near here last month, said to me recently that she is so poor that she must find work as a housekeeper as soon as possible.

"Sir William's Civil List pension of £200 a year died with him," she said. That was what we lived on. He never got a penny from his poems.

Lady Watson, twenty years her husband's junior, blue-eyed, volubly Irish, told of her long struggle against poverty.

"From the day we married we were never out of debt," she said. "My husband had no idea of the value of money and used to say, 'It does not matter whether they buy my poems or not. It is enough that I have written them. I never entered his head that we had to keep a roof over our heads.'"

The widow and her two daughters, Rhona, aged twenty-one, and Geraldine, aged eighteen, have visited many registry offices in the district, and have put their names down for domestic work, preferably as housekeepers.

"It is a pity Geraldine has to give up her art career," said Lady Watson "but she wants to help the family. We should like to get a payment somewhere together."

"I am going to write my husband's life story when the book appears a lot of people-famous people-will get a shock. It is time sent the money by return of post."

Issues Denial Of Stevens' Statements

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BRANDON, Sept. 24 - Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture, today issued a denial to statements made by Hon. H. H. Stevens, at North Gower, last night when the leader of the Reconstruction Party said farmers were refused by Stanley McLean and Hon. Robert Weir the right to sell hogs graded separately.

"Because Mr. McLean and Mr. Weir will not pass regulations to have hogs graded separately, you can't get a fair price for them," Mr. Stevens further stated.

In his denial today Mr. Weir said 'there never has been anything in our grading regulations to prevent the sale of hogs according to grade. All hogs are required to be graded and separated, according to grades.'

"Previous to March, 1934, the majority of hogs marketed at Montreal were sold on a flat basis. Since then my department has taken the necessary action to see all hogs were sold according to grade and that grade might be sold separately according to the wish of the farmer," Mr. Weir stated.

Mr. Weir also took exception to Mr. Stevens' statement that "the price of bacon on the British market is fixed by a bacon committee and on that committee are British wholesalers who purchase the bacon, and agents of Canada Packers, Ltd." "The methods and procedure of selling bacon on the British market," Mr. Weir asserted, "are exactly the same as employed by Denmark, Sweden and other exporting countries. There never has been any suggestion that Danish bacon was not sold to the best advantage yet."

Women's Golf Title Remains In Western Canada

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) ROYAL COLWOOD GOLF CLUB Victoria, Sept. 22 - Western Canada has its third Canadian women's close golf championship tucked away today by virtue of the victory of Mrs. Roy Horne of Calgary over Mrs. E. H. Gooderham of Toronto 3 and 1 in the 18-hole final Saturday. She succeeds Mrs. Vera Hutchings Ford of Vancouver.

The Calgary shotmaker played steady golf to take a one-up lead at the end of the first nine holes, and increased her margin on the incoming route.

The old golf proverb, "the medalist rarely survives match play," stood up as the blonde-haired matron from Toronto met defeat.

Playing under ideal weather conditions the finalists appeared nervous on the greens and as a result three-putting was frequent by both. Their long games were good, both smashing out distant tee shots and powerful brasses and spoons. At times their approaches were dead.

France Limits Porter's Tips

MOSCOW, Sept. 25. - Soviet science told the story today of how the hearts of 35 children, removed from their bodies after death, were made to beat again-some for as long as four hours.

A solution containing adrenalin was used in the experiment, described by Prof. B. Oestmoffsky of the Government Institute for the Protection of Children's Health, and conducted in his laboratory. The hearts, he said, were re-

DOES SALMON RISE TO FLY IN PLAY OR BECAUSE OF HUNGER

Does a salmon rise to a fly in fresh water because it is hungry or just for fun? This question has arisen with renewed force by the finding by Guide Jack Russell of Ludlow, N.B., and an ardent angler of Huntington, N.Y., F. D. Edsall, of freshly caught flies in the stomachs of Atlantic silver salmon caught on the Southwest Miramichi River in New Brunswick. It has long been an opinion that salmon never feed in fresh water, states the Fish and Game Department of the Canadian National Railways, although there have been two well authenticated cases where salmon took insects in fresh water, one case being in Canada and the other in Scotland. And so experts are again debating the subject pro and con.
