LONDON, Feb. 15.—No. 48 Grosvenor street, Mayfair, the mansion of Sir Edgar Speyer, the banker, was offered for sale yesterday, but was withdrawn at £24,000. When it was put up at auction in 1920, bidding stopped at £21,000, and the property was bought by Sir Edgar Speyer, who was naturalized in 1922, was found guilty of trading with the Germans during the war, and was denaturalized. TO ENLARGE COAL OUTPUT

SYDNEY, Feb. 15.—The British Empire Steel Corporation has in prospect a very considerable building equipment programme, according to announcement. There is contemplated a complete renewal on a large scale of the coal carrying equipment, which will probably comprise an order of 200 forty-ton capacity steel cars and 500 fifteen ton wooden hopper cars.

NEW BRUNSWICK HAS SURPLUS

FREDERICTON, Feb. 15.—A surplus of \$70,576 over current expenditures is recorded by the Provincial Government during 1922. This does not take into consideration the Valley Railway bond interest and other indebtedness, and which is not regarded as a legitimate charge on the revenue of the province. The receipts from succession duties last year were \$261,597 as compared with \$151,325 in the previous year.

Hints at Bigness
of Griffith Film

Fourteen Acre Reproduction of Old
Paris Built for "Orphans of
the Storm."

MILLION DOLLAR OUTLAY
Twenty-six Tons of Properties
From France—300,000 Feet
of Lumber Used

A million dollar outlay for a pro-
duction at the D. W. Griffith stu-
dio is no longer a novelty. Hence,
nothing about the cost of his 1922
picture "Orphans of the Storm," is
considered of unusual public in-
terest. But here are some of the
figures that indicate the magnitude
of the film, a United Artists Co-
poration release, which will be
seen in Charlottetown at the
Prince Edward Theatre next Wed-
nesday and Thursday.

The reproduction of old Paris,
which serves as a background for
the Titanic turmoil of the revolu-
tion scenes, covered fourteen acres.
This is the largest studio set ever
erected.

Twenty-six tons of properties
were imported from France to pro-
vide detail for the picture.
More than 300,000 feet of lumber
were used in building the scenery.
There were 300 tons of paving
stones laid to give the streets the
proper touch of realism.

With brush or with pneumatic
spray, ninety barrels of paint were
spread over the setting.
For further realism, 4,000 panes
of glass were put into the win-
dows facing the streets of the
play metropolis.

Three exact reproductions of
houses still standing in Paris and
past which the death carts rumbled
guiltily over a hundred
years ago are among the accurate
details followed in this production.

Among interiors, the room in
which the King of France appears
is an exact duplicate in size, decor-
ations and detail of the grand sal-
on in the Paris at Versailles.

In the months of study were
required to prepare for this drama-
tically elaborated version of the
famous "Two Orphans" of D'En-
ry. Nine months of actual work
were done before the master hand
scribed "O. K." on the finished
production.
