JUBILEE OF CONFEDERATION.—The Guardian is indebted to Hon. Premier Arsenault, for a neat little brochure entitled "The Jubilee of Confederation" giving a record of the celebration of this great event in Ottawa on July 2, 1917. The brochure contains a foreword by Sir George E. Foster, Chairman of the Committee, different Committees who arranged the celebration, the inscription on the tablet placed upon the central column in the great entrance hall of the new Parliament Building and summaries of the addresses given on the occasion. There are also excellent portraits of His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, the central entrance hall of the new Parliament Buildings, Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The booklet is historically valuable presenting as it does a permanent record of the Jubilee of Confederation of Canada.

MILITARY MEDAL FOR ISLAND HERO KILLED IN ACTION. For the first time in the history of Prince Edward Island a military medal will be presented in Charlottetown. On Saturday, January 5th, the presentation will be made in the Legislative Council Chamber by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor—unfortunately not to the soldier who won it but to his father, the former having given his life in winning it. The hero was No. 444189, Private Peter Aeneas McAulay, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ferdinand McAulay of Charlottetown. Private McAulay enlisted in Charlottetown on May 1st, 1915 in the first re-enforcing draft of the 55th Battalion and went overseas with the draft, sailing from Montreal on the St. Corsican on June 19, 1915. He was later transferred to the 14th Battalion, Royal Montreal Regiment, and was in a number of engagements. On September 27th, 1916, he was instantly killed by a shell while "helping out a wounded comrade." For this brave act, following a splendid career as a soldier, he was awarded the military medal. This medal has been forwarded to the Lieutenant-Governor of this province and will be formally presented as above stated. The presentation will be in due military form, the officers and men of the depot here being in attendance and addresses suitable to the occasion will be delivered by His Honour and other prominent public men. Mr. and Mrs. McAulay, the parents of the deceased soldier, will be present to receive the melancholy testimonial to their son's bravery.
