Four Candidates For Liberal Leader

While Pennsylvania has been one of the leading centres of light harness racing since the Hunting Park Course was opened at Philadelphia in 1828, Robert J. Maxie Cobb, and Miss Bertha Dillon are the only champions that were bred in the state. This has not come about on account of a limited supply of horses as even in 1832 when William Penn arrived, he found plenty of them and reported "horses not very handsome but good." These horses were owned by the Swedes, Dutch and English located on the Delaware River.

Forty years later the sons and grandsons of these people were buying Narragansett pacers to race on the circular track laid out on a Philadelphia common near the Race Street of today. These races were continued until 1750 when they were prohibited by the Colonial legislature.

When this little ray of joy was snuffed out, the Quakers crossed the Flemish cart and English dray horses that hauled the freight wagons over the mountains to the point where the Allegheny and Monongahela united to form the Ohio River at Port Pitt, the Pittsburgh of today. Also in the interval, Philadelphia became the port of entry in 1797 of the English horse Messenger and in 1820 of the African completion, Manbrino and barb horse Grand Bashaw from Tripoli. The former became the tap root Champion families while the latter bore the same relation to the Clays. Grand Bashaw got Young Bashaw, the source of two speed lines. One ran through Dobie's Bashaw and Tip-top Bashaw to Duquesne, 2,173, owned and raced by Paul Hacke and the other line ran through Andrew Jackson, the best trotter of his day, to Kemble Jackson, a good race horse that died before he got many foals, as well as Long Island Black Hawk and Henry Clay, both of which made their reputations in New York.

No organized effort was made to breed trotters in Pennsylvania until the sixties when C. P. Reif purchased Mambrino Pilot and Lady Thorn in Kentucky and Aristides Welch added a few to the Erdenheim stud. Welch began with the runners. In 1869 he purchased Leamington, and bred brood mares, the only American bred horse that won the English Derby, to that date he purchased Flora Temple, the first 2:20 trotter and bred two foals from her, one being Prince Imperial by William Welch and the other Queen's Daughter by Leamington. Welch also bred the Hambletonian stallions Rysdyk, sire of Clingstone and Strathmore, to whom Lou Dillon, the best two minute trotter, traces the male line through Sidney Dillon, Sidney and Santa Claus. Hannis was the best trotter got by Mambrino Pilot in Pennsylvania while he also sired the champion stallion Mambrina Gift before he was shipped from Kentucky.

Powell Bros. added a trotting partnership to their farm at Shadeland in the sixties. Satellite was one of their first stallions, and St. Vincent the best. Also at a latter date their neighbor C. G. Dempsey began mingling trotting and running strains when he was not following the races.

In 1871 Robert Steel established Cedar Park Farm near Philadelphia and placed Happy Medium at the head of it. While there he got Pilot Medium, the sire of Peter the Great, the champion trotting stallion Maxie Cobb, 2:13 1-4, and his mate Neta Medium, with which he reduced the team record to 2:15 3-4. When Happy Medium was transferred to Kentucky, where he sired Nancy Hanks, 2:04, he was succeeded by Epaul and Woodnut. During their day R. J. C. Walker had Hartford at Williamsport where he got the pacer Robert J. who after defeating all of the best horses of his day reduced the world's record from 2:04 to 2:01 1-2.

Among the other stock farms which occupied a place in the public eye in Pennsylvania, the leaders were Pine Hill Farm at Franklin, owned by Miller and Sibley, and at one time referred to as the Palo Alto of the east on account of the number of Eldestoners owned there; the Penn Valley Farm at Morrisville, where H. S. Henry had Young Wilkes and Antee; A. H. Moore's establishment near Philadelphia, where he took Director, Red Wilkes, and a splendid band of race mares, which included Evangeline, Margaret S., and Position; the Wilson farm at Ephrata, where Esther W., 2:10 1-4, was foaled; as well as the farms where Heptagon, Hull, Crawford, Moquette, Hal Braden, Star Pointer, Ass H. Kay, Alhewood, Silent Brigade, Joe Pointer and a number of other horses stood at present. Nawshek Farm, the home of Dillon Axworthy, at Paoli is the leader, its reputation having been established by Miss Bertha Dillon, who after equalling the three year old record in 1917, cut the four year old record for fillies to 2:02 1-4 in a race, the Kentucky year old champion gelding Norman Dillon, The Divorcee, The Cessack, and the two year old champion gelding Norman Dillon, 2:07 1-4. In the western part of the state Watts Jr., a grandson of Axworthy, is being given an opportunity at Reamore Farm to duplicate his showing as a trotter on the half-mile tracks. Bingen has also a worthy representative in Pennsylvania in Senator Hale. He is located at Gettysburg, where he has got a number of successful performers, the fastest being the pacer Butt Hale, 2:02 3-4.

While since the earliest days, there has always been considerable breeding done in Pennsylvania, the majority of owners have purchased their racing material in other states. This is shown by the names of the horses that were bred by the Dobles, Turner, Phillips, Scattergood, Grady, Pat-

NO DEFINITE POLICY YET.

While there is a barrel of suggested resolutions which are being proposed as being the shape of definite policy has yet developed. What is being talked of mainly on the side if not in the actual conclaves is the leadership, and in regard to that there is no particular variation. While there are divided opinions on the subject, the Fielding boom is still conspicuous on the surface. He is reported to have a fairly solid support from the West and a substantial vote from Ontario, Quebec and the lower provinces. While Messrs Graham and King will likely be balloted on in the last analysis it looks like Fielding or McKenzie.

Inevitably as stated there will be two elements—the hard-boiled Grits who have no love for anything of the Unionist stripe and the more moderate species who want to get together in the hope of winning out. Upon the degree of relative predominance of these will depend the selection of the leader.

EVEN QUEBEC FOR FIELDING.

The moderates are mostly for Fielding, though Mr. Graham will have a considerable support. The younger element from Quebec are reported to be against Fielding not only because of his quasi Unionism but on some old scores, but if what can be learned from the M. P.'s can be accepted as gospel, he fits the favorite even from that province. When Sir Wilfrid Laurier died and within a few days of that event it was necessary to select a temporary leader, Fielding was mentioned, but in the caucus the French Liberals insisted on McKenzie. At the close of the session his popularity had waned a bit. It was felt that something was lacking.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—A change has been made in the air mail schedule between New York and Washington by which the mail from New York and New England will reach Washington in time for the early afternoon delivery and the mail from Washington and southern connections to New York will reach that city about 1 o'clock.

The air mail will hereafter leave New York at 8:40 a.m. arriving in Washington at 11 a.m. Operating on this schedule all New York City mail which reaches the post office too late for the midnight train for Washington and all New England mail reaching New York between midnight and 8 a.m. will be carried by airplane to Washington.

The New England mail is advanced about 16 hours and all mail from New York left over from the midnight train is in time for the first afternoon delivery in Washington.
