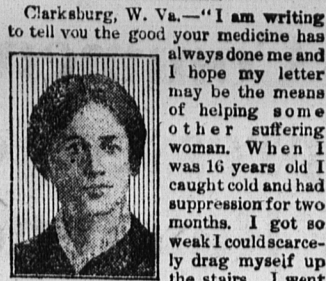

FALLS 50 FEET AND IS KILLED

Peter E. Matheson of Winsloe, an employee of the Hollingsworth & Whitney mill, died yesterday, Sept. 6th at the Sisters' hospital, 40 minutes after falling in an elevator in the sulphite room at the mill.

Elevator Falls.

The roar of the elevator which fell a distance of 50 feet was heard in various parts of the mill and at the mill office some distance away. When other employees reached the spot Mr. Matheson was lying on the floor of the sulphite room close to the elevator. He was unconscious but still breathing.

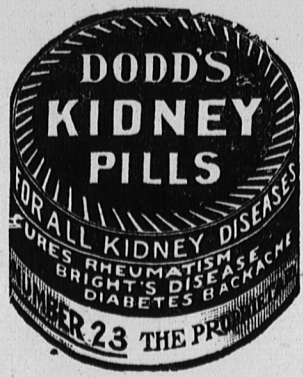
It was found at the hospital that the skull had been crushed, several ribs on the right side were fractured and he had sustained a compound fracture of the right leg midway between the knee and the ankle. He died without regaining consciousness.

He is survived by the widow and five children, all boys, the eldest 11 and the youngest a years old in April; Alvin, Donald, Neal, Fred and Boyer.

The funeral services for the late Peter E. Matheson were held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the home on the Cushman road. Rev. David Jack of Derry, N. H., and Rev. F. K. Conant of this town officiated. A large number of the neighbors, friends members of Farnham Lodge, No. 39, I. O. O. F., the Order of Woodman and representatives from the Hollingsworth mill attended. An immense number of beautiful floral offerings testified to the love and sympathy of friends and also were contributed by various orders. The interment was at Pine Grove cemetery, Waterville, Sentinel, Waterville, Me.

The deceased is a son of the late Alexander Matheson of Milltown Cross, P. E. I.

WILL HELP RUSSIA IN TRANSPORTATION.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Immediate aid in solving Russia's transportation problems will be given by the American Government. Shipment of locomotives and cars to Vladivostok will be rushed across the Pacific in Japanese vessels, and American railway men will be sent to serve as inspectors along the Trans-Siberian railway.

The breaking down of Russia's transportation system has been one of her chief handicaps in prosecuting the war. Thousands of tons of freight is piled on the ground at Vladivostok, which Russian railway men have found no way to move. The arrival of American locomotives in large numbers is expected to be of great assistance in starting this freight westward.

American officials are considering proposing to the Russian Government that a section of the Trans-Siberian line be turned over to a group of American railway for operation. The Americans would train Russian crews who would be distributed to other sections of fast as possible.

ACTION AGAINST U-BOATS YIELDS GOOD RESULTS.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—(Via Reuters Ottawa Agency)—From a high British naval authority Reuter's has received the following information: "Despite talk in certain quarters there is no reason to believe, and there is certainly no evidence, that Germany is adopting new tactics in U-boat warfare. Nobody claims that the menace has been overcome, but people should not because of that blindly swallow all Germany's claims. "The Germans talk contemptuously about the loss of one of their U-boats monthly. They know that to be nonsense. I am not going to inform the enemy by quoting actual figures but I can tell you that action against U-boats during the last three months has yielded what I call good results

AN ANTI ORATOR PLACED IN JAIL. MONTREAL, Sept. 12.—The anti-scriptionist oratory of Fernand Villeneuve came to a sudden termination tonight. A few minutes after he had addressed a gathering of antis in Lafontaine Park in very inflammatory words, he was quietly arrested at the corner of Amherst and Robin streets, and taken away without any disturbance at the meeting. His arrest was announced shortly afterward. It was not for his speech tonight that Villeneuve was taken into custody by the authorities, but for previous addresses, though his address tonight was specially violent. He said that when the time was ripe it would be far better for the Canadian people to raise the flaming flag of a free republic over the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa than to stay under the tyranny of the Union Jack. If this could not be done, he said, American aid would be called in, as the Stars and Stripes would be a much better flag than the Union Jack. Alphonse Bernier, just after learning of the arrest of Villeneuve, declared that "the English flag is the most corrupt flag in the world." Later he announced that he was going down to St. Catherine street, and he wanted ten stout-French-Canadians to go along to see that he got there. The wished-for bodyguard responded, and Bernier made his departure. Michael Leavitt, one of the speakers, admitted that the British flag gave more freedom than did the flag of the United States.
