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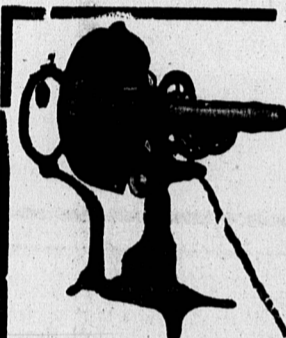

A TRIP TO GERMANY

The following letter was received from William Angelo Coady by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Coady, Embyvale. Siegenburg, Germany Jan. 7th, 1919

Dear Father and Mother:— Your welcome letter received yesterday, was pleased to get the news from home and to know you are all well. We are in excellent health over here. Well all the big feast days are over, they were just the same as any other day to us. I was on guard Christmas standing along a railroad track all day and night, and for New Years, I had a street picket to do in Bonn, a large and beautiful city on the Rhine. We were up here at Siegenburg and mulldog before, doing twenty one days out post, and were relieved by the 26th Batt. We then retired to Bonn for a rest, had a fine time there, were quartered in Hiney's barracks, they were comfortable, each room had a stove and good bunks. We did one hours drill in the morning and had the rest of the day off. One of our boys got killed down there, in a bar, by a civilian, I suppose he will hang for it. We thought we were going back to France from there, intending to leave yesterday. We expected to be relieved by the fourth army of Imperials, but were not, so we had to proceed up the line again.

I'm not doing any drill now, as they have started a khaki school for the benefit of the boys, and I am teaching a class. The hours are from ten thirty to twelve, after that I am clear. We crossed the border Dec. 6th

with our bayonets fixed, the civilians were very frightened, but now give us a good name. We had quite a long march from that to the Rhine, with a hilly road, were pretty well played out when we got to our journey's end. We started from Mons. It is one hundred and eighty miles the way we came. In heavy marching order, each one carrying seventy five pounds. We went at the rate of fifteen to twenty miles a day. I don't want to do it over again. We crossed the Rhine Bridge at Bonn. It certainly is a grand one and now are as far in as we can go according to peace terms. There was a big draft left the twenty-fifth Battalion this morning for Cambrai. They were miners, I expect we will all be demobilized before long. This is a great place to pass the winter in, just like summer, everything green and the sun scorching. I don't think they have any winter. It is a grand country, some beautiful cities and I think a splendid climate, a deep rich soil and should yield splendid crops. The farmers are busy working in the fields ploughing and harrowing but clear of that I don't see how they won their smart name. They go about work very awkward and have poor implements. We would not burn them for firewood in Canada.

We have a Y. M. C. A. here lined with Canadian groceries also reading and writing rooms. I saw by the Canadian papers they were some heavy storms in Canada. I suppose it is pretty frosty on the island now. I hope to be home before another winter. Don't send me any more socks for I have a doz. pairs and one could go in his bare feet, it is so warm. James was glad to get clear of the navy. I knew he wouldn't like it but

I think it better than to have big shells bursting around you and no shelter. I am keeping a bullet for a souvenir, that a sniper aimed at me. We were at the edge of the woods, I was leaning against a tree, when a bullet went into the same tree, I dug it out with my bayonet, when it got dusk.

Tell little Lucy and Ida I'll have something nice to send them home from Germany. Am going out for a walk now so will close with best love to all at home.

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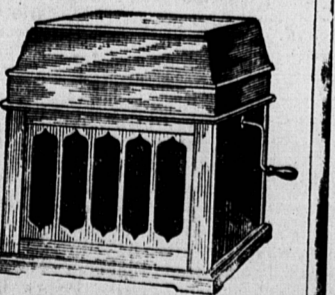
