Refugees Escape Nazi Domination To Help Norway

LITTLE NORWAY, MUSKOKA, Ont., Dec. 10 (CP)—There's a new uniform in Canada. At Camp Little Norway near Gravenhurst, Ont., a small group of Norwegian girls have donned the blue of the Norwegian Women's Auxiliary Air Force and are training to join the N.W.A.A.F. in England.

Some of these girls remember a flight from Nazi-scavenged Norway, others have dim recollections of a pleasant childhood here and a few were born in Canada or the United States of Norwegian parents, but without exception they all want to go back as soon as the war is over. In the meanwhile they commute daily to Little Norway from nearby districts doing whatever job will release their countrymen for combat duty.

There's young Anne Novik who with her family and two friends crept from under the Nazi thumb to the New World in a 70 foot boat.

"There were 23 of us—my parents, uncles, aunts, cousins, two friends and my six month old sister, Aud," she said in telling of the party's experience.

They slipped from island to island at night until they reached the Pares north of Scotland. While on the trip they hid in a cave while a U-boat searched for them. At three different times German bombers appeared overhead looking for them.

After something like 3,000 miles, a mixture of hide and seek and of sailing seas heavy for the little ship, they reached St. John's Nfld. and then Sydney, N.S. But the journey was not ended and they set out by way of the Panama Canal for Vancouver where they had friends.

Anne wants to go to England where her sister Aud is nursing at a Norwegian hospital, but meantime she works at the R. C. A. F. headquarters in Toronto and helps send Norwegian newspapers to her countrymen training in Canada.

The story of Mrs. Lillemor Simonsen covers most of the globe. At Easter in Norway people go to the mountains for holidays and sports, and Mrs. Simonsen and her husband were granted permission to go to one of these resorts. On April 9, 1941, exactly one year after the invasion of Norway, they escaped into Sweden.

There with hundreds of Norwegians they waited for seats on a plane operated by a commercial Russian airline. The plane carried them to Moscow, but they had to leave that city quickly. A four-day train trip took them to Odessa on the Black Sea, where they boarded a Russian ship.

The first port was Varna, Bulgaria, and because that was occupied country they had to lie low.

Up to the present the Women's Auxiliary Air Force has supplied headquarters and Little Norway with secretaries, teletype operator, airplane painter, cook, photographer, operator, hospital helper, kitchen helper and waitress.

Lucky Jackie Looked After By 70 Co-Eds

WINNIPEG, Dec. 10 (CP)—Young Jackie has 70 starry-eyed young women running around at his beck and call, but he takes it nonchalantly in his stride as though it were the due of every young man five months of age.

Jackie is one of the first male members of the Home Economics Faculty of the University of Manitoba. He will remain in his bachelorette surroundings with all those co-eds looking after him until April when the girls will have to turn their attentions to examinations and forget about men.

The Home Economics faculty obtains babies like Jackie every year from the Child Welfare Bureau to give the girls a real subject on which to practise their course in child care. Jackie is the faculty's child care, Jackie is returned to his mother at the end of the girls' training period. Each girl in the faculty has three days in which Jackie is entirely in her care.

Jackie is the only gentleman on campus who gets away with sleeping regularly through lectures. In fact, he yawns with impunity right in the lecturer's face. He is taken for regular walks in his pram with beves of attendants bowing and scraping to his every whim.

The University of Manitoba is the only Canadian educational institution which can boast a guest in Jackie's status. He is housed in a special building complete with nursery, kitchen and quarters for his regular attendants.

Just like genuine mothers, the co-eds have Jackie's career all mapped out for him, insisting that his masterful air indicates that he will be an engineer or a scientist. He has brown eyes and plain red hair, but the girls insist that he is a "strawberry blonde".
