Y. M. C. A. DIRECTORS MEET.—The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Y. M. C. A. was held Monday night of this week. Vice President J. A. Clark presiding. The routine business was carried through, and the reports of the various departments show that the activity in the building is increasing from month to month. The following officers of motion was given which will be of interest to all Association members: "In connection with the proposed change of the fiscal year from December 31st, to April 30th, I wish to make notice of motion that this matter be dealt with at the Annual meeting, and that the time be changed as above, making the next list of officers and Directors to serve a period of sixteen months rather than the regular twelve months period." After discussion it was decided to call the Annual Meeting for January 2nd, to adjourn to January 10th. Mr. Sidenius acting Territorial Secretary was present at the meeting and introduced the Y. M. C. A. Secretary's Retirement Fund which is being organized throughout North America. He urged the local Association to participate, and after discussion it was unanimously decided by the Directors that the Charlottetown participate. Mr. Sidenius also spoke of the Territorial Annual Meeting which is to be held in Moncton, January 24th, and the National Committee meeting to be held in Montreal January 26th. A report of the membership Committee was as follows: Renewals for November 21, New Members 24, total membership today 585 of which 474 are paid up and in good standing. Mr. R. H. Jenks reported for the Finance Committee. November receipts, \$522.05. Expenditures \$346.79. Outstanding amounts on Campaign pledges about \$700.00.

EGYPTIAN PREMIER Has Handed In His Resignation

CAIRO, Egypt, Dec. 10.—Adly Pasha the Egyptian Premier resigned from that office today. Premier Adly Pasha headed the Egyptian delegation which recently returned from London, having refused to accept the British proposals for all agreement designed to establish Egyptian independence and to end the British protectorate. A despatch from Cairo, on Monday of this week, stated that a movement was on foot to create a National party, of which the independent Egypt party would probably form the nucleus. The despatch said Adly Pasha's resignation as Premier was considered certain, and added that his friends hoped he would consent to become Premier of the new party which was to carry on the work for Egyptian independence while following strictly constitutional lines.

New Pastor Of Waterloo Street Baptist Church

ST. JOHN, Dec. 8.—Rev. John A. Swetnam, the new pastor at the Waterloo street Baptist church, is an Englishman by birth and has been in this country some twelve years. He received his education in England and after coming to this country attended the Gordon Theological Training College, Boston. He has held some important charges in the Baptist denomination. He is a very forceful evangelist preacher and is a fine singer of the gospel songs. He has conducted several evangelistic campaigns, has also conducted campaigns for other churches. He has taken great interest in the work of the denomination and was secretary of the district meeting in Cumberland, Annapolis counties.

Mrs. Swetnam was formerly a Charlottetown, P. E. I., young lady of the family of J. J. Rouse. Rev. Mr. Swetnam's family consists of two boys.

Senator Gave Blood To Save Life Of Sailor

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Dec 9.—Although three half-pints of blood were transfused from the arm of State Senator Frederick A. H. Bodington, of Little Compton into the body of Howard Goodwin, Canso, N. S., overcome by coal gas as he slept in the cabin of a sloop at Seacomet Point, Goodwin died at a hospital in Fall River, last night. Matthew Yard, of Little Compton also asphyxiated as he slept in the cabin has not recovered consciousness at the hospital, where it is said he will probably recover. The stack of a coal stove in the cabin blew off while the men were sleeping and the fumes from the fire poured into the small enclosure. Goodwin and Yard were found unconscious and hardly breathing in the morning. A pulmonologist failed to revive the men and Senator Bodington volunteered to give his blood in order that the man might be saved.

Rescued In Mid-Ocean

BOSTON, December 9.—The rescue of the captain and crew of seven men of the Newfoundland auxiliary schooner Ruby W., in mid-ocean early today was reported in a wireless message from the new Danish steamer Gudrun Maersk, relayed here by the steamer Centennial State late today. Captain Forward, of the schooner, had one arm broken and one of the crew was suffering from a bruised knee.
The Gudrun Maersk, bound from Philadelphia, for Genoa, reported that she encountered the disabled schooner at 2 a. m. today in latitude 40.08 north, longitude 56.62 west, or about 900 miles east of New York. No details were given as to the cause of the wreck or how the crew were taken off. The wreckage was set afire before the steamer left the scene.
The Ruby W. registered 287 tons and sailed from Pernambuco on November 6th from St. John's Nfld.
