

### LAND EROSION IN ENGLAND

LONDON, Dec. 9 (Special)—Engineering, dealing with the erosion by the sea of the English coast, takes the view that England does not gain as much as it loses. Much of the eroded material settled upon the bed of the ocean, and is not deposited again on other parts of the coast. Even if it were, it is of little gratification to a landowner or a corporation to know that his or their land has made its appearance on some remote part of the coast; and it is adding insult to injury when the Crown, which has hitherto contributed nothing to the cost of protecting the coast, promptly seizes the new land when it appears. This is constantly happening on the Yorkshire coast.

### GERMANY'S NEW DEFENCE BILL

BERLIN, Dec. 9 (Special)—The campaign in Germany for fresh naval and military Bills has been taken up by General Keim, the president of the Army League, who states that it is urgently necessary for Germany before the end of this year to pass another "Defence Bill" on the lines of the naval and military increases of last spring.

"Those who affirm that the most praiseworthy object is the maintenance of peace," he writes in the "Tägliche Rundschau," "cannot do anything more correct than to make the best preparations for war. The temptation to attack us cannot be effectively discouraged except by the strongest armaments on our part. This is the most proper and most important thing that Germany now has to do. The superlative expressions of the 'best preparations' and the 'strongest armaments' are most appropriate at this hour."

"There is only one thing to be done which corresponds to the gravity of the present situation, as well as that of the near future, and that is for the Government to bring in a new Defence Bill before the end of the year."

## GERMAN MONEY IN TURKISH EMPIRE

### INSURANCE AND WAGES

PARIS, Dec. 9 (Special)—At a Ministerial Council the Minister of Labor, M. Bourgeois, was authorized to introduce the long-promised Bill which is intended to remedy the situation created by the decision of the Court of Cassation that an employer of labor cannot be prosecuted for not deducting from the wages of his employees the amount of their contributions under the compulsory Old-Age Insurance Act. The Bill proposes that an employer who has neglected to affix stamps of the value of the compulsory contribution shall be subject to a civil penalty which may be imposed by the Judge de l'air.

The penalty consists in imposing upon the employer the obligation to make an additional payment to the pension fund amounting to 3 per cent of the compulsory contribution which ought to have been paid. This penalty will be inflicted in cases where, after neglect to affix the insurance stamps in the course of one year, the employer's or the employee's contributions have again not been paid in the course of the following year. It is understood, however, that the arrears and the penalty will be collected by means of a practically private summons from the Prefect, as in the case of persons who have neglected to pay their taxes.

### IS Said to be in a Flourishing Condition. General Satisfaction is Felt

BERLIN, Dec. 9 (Special)—Many tens of millions of German money are invested in the Turkish Empire, European and Asiatic, and there has been much trepidation as to how the fortunes of war are going to affect them. The "Doutche Bank," the engineer-general of Teutonic enterprise in the Turkey, comes out with the comforting statement that German investors have no ground for alarm. Railway undertakings, the German specialty in Turkey, are said to be in "extraordinarily flourishing condition," and there is no fear that the war, however it ends, will seriously arrest their progress. Judged by the results of the Russo-Turkish war, the Ottoman Empire, it is said, will be enhanced, not retarded, by events to come.

### ALL OVER EUROPE

LONDON, Dec. 7 (Special)—In an exceedingly interesting book just published, "Steamship Conquest of the World," by Frederick A. Talbot some interesting statements are made about iceboats. While the mariner has no reliable means of detecting the immediate presence of ice there are certain signs which may assist him to discover his enemy. As a rule, before the ice is seen from the deck of a vessel its proximity is indicated by the reflection of the rays from the sun or the moon. Under good weather conditions a berg may be seen from a considerable distance. Similarly on a clear night it may be discovered by the effulgence of light radiated from the mass, while in foggy weather it may be picked up by its apparent blackness, if such a term may be used, as the outline is revealed in a deep shadow through the whiteness of the mist.

If the fog horn or siren is sounded a berg may be discovered and its distance calculated approximately, the time elapsing between the blast of the whistle and the echo multiplied by 550 will give the distance of the peril.

### LITTLE BOOK TWO, CENTURIES OLD

LONDON, Dec. 9 (Special)—From "Notes and Queries" it is learned that the contents, in very microscopic handwriting, of a tiny book described in the catalogue of the Bodleian Library as "The Smallest MS. in the Library," have at last been deciphered. The book has been in the Library for more than two centuries and a half; its pages measure three-quarters of an inch in length and three-quarters of an inch in breadth; it is bound in black leather with silver corners; and it is attached to a chain and kept in a red leather box. The pages are covered with very minute shorthand. An enthusiastic stenographic expert has identified it as a Sermon transcribed by a famous seventeenth-century practitioner of the art, Jeremiah Rich, who boasted that he "could write so small that his pen could scarcely be seen to move." These feats were more common in those days than in our own. It appears that the same penman presented Charles III. with another specimen of his skill—a copy of the same sermon, written on fine paper, bound in crimson "with silver clasps and corners," the book and its covers being "less than the nail of his little finger." The whereabouts of this curiosity are unknown. It is one of those books that are not intended to be read; but it may have been preserved.
