Lord Salisbury now holds the record of having been Premier for a longer period than any other since the passage of the Reform Bill.

The death of Senator Villeneuve of Quebec is announced. He was born in 1836 and in early life was a merchant. He was appointed to the Senate in January 1890 by the Conservative Government. His demise will further lessen the Conservative majority in the red chamber.

Halifax is a good deal excited over the action of Bishop Courtney in striking off the hat of a young man who neglected to uncover his head when the National Anthem was being played. The action may be thought by some to be creditable to the Bishop's loyalty, but we think was hardly compatible with the dignity and office of a Bishop. We find it laid down in a work of high authority that "A Bishop then must be blameless, the husband of one wife, vigilant, sober, of good behavior, given to hospitality, apt to teach, not given to wine, no striker."

The announcement of the candidature of Premier Farquharson in West Queens with the assumed assurance of a Cabinet position, has created some stir throughout the Dominion. It has caused surprise on the mainland. The press comments all go to show that the action taken here is quite out of line with the plans and intentions of the party leaders at Ottawa and elsewhere. Sir Louis Davies is still a member of the Cabinet and will still be so when he reaches the Island on his return from England a few weeks hence. Till then we must wait for a solution of the problem of now divided counsels.

The Victoria, B. C. Colonist in a series of fifteen articles on British Columbia reaches the conclusion that the Province needs 2,000 miles of trunk line railway, to cost \$60,000,000, branch lines that will cost \$15,000,000 more, with a further expenditure of \$25,000,000 on ordinary roads, trails, bridges, etc., making a grand total of 100 millions. As the Colonist fully observes, "this is a tremendous proposition to be contemplated by a Government, supported by a population of 150,000." Yet the ambitious Colonist argues that the vast expenditure will pay, so great are the undeveloped resources of the Pacific Province. As Joe Howe would say, "they think in millions," on the sunset shore of the Dominion.

The death of Andrew Allan of Montreal head of the famous Allan Steamship line is announced. The deceased ship-owner was born in Ayr-shire, Scotland in 1822. He came to Canada in 1839, and in 1846 joined his brother, the late Sir Hugh Allan, in business in Montreal as importers and general merchants. The firm established a line of fast sailing packets to accommodate the passenger and freight traffic between Canada and the United Kingdom. In 1853 they began to add steamships to their fleet, and eventually founded the Montreal Ocean Steamship Company. They accumulated great wealth. On the death of Sir Hugh Allan, Andrew Allan succeeded to the presidency of the Company. He was an adherent of the Church of Scotland, and among the first of "the merchant kings of Canada."

On this occasion the costumes of the girls were of various shades and textures, that of Miss Quigley being blue crepe dechene with trimmings of lace and velvet in which she looked charming.

N. DESTRUVE, Russian Consul General arrived in the city by the Princess yesterday evening. In referring to Mr. Destruve a Sydney despatch says: Mr. Destruve, who was sent here to report for his government, was surprised at the magnitude of the company's works. When fully developed he considered they would be the largest on the continent, and he said the prospects at Sydney were brighter than those at the Clergue works at Sault Ste. Marie. Mr. Destruve said Russia was much interested in Canada and Canadian industries, and he expected that a large amount of trade would arise shortly between the Pacific ports. He thought the harbor of Sydney could be kept open all the year, as the Russian ports are in winter. Tomorrow Mr. Destruve will confer with Acting Manager Dick, of the Coal Company, relative to supplying coal to the Russian government. From here he goes to Prince Edward Island. The object of his travelling is to become acquainted with Canadian industries.

**FATALITIES CAUSED BY LIGHTNING**  
Lightning struck the home of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Russan in East Woodstock, Conn., during a terrific thunderstorm Saturday afternoon, instantly killing Ralph, two and a half years old; burning Clarence, five year old, so severely that he will probably die, and terribly burning the father and another son, Ewald, seven years of age. The lives of the two latter may be saved. All the victims, with Mrs. Russan and a four-months-old baby, were in the sitting room waiting for the storm to pass over, when a bolt struck a pine tree near by and entered the house. The lightning demolished the furniture and tore away partitions, causing a money loss of \$500 or \$600.
