We have few speakers in these days who possess in so generous measure the power to clothe clear conceptions of truth with graceful language as Dr. Gauthier. His eulogy of Mr. Whelan is not fulsome, but while eloquent it is also discriminating and just.

There are many who have been accustomed to link together the names of Coles and Whelan and who would like to see their memory perpetuated by a joint monument. It was announced yesterday at the Whelan demonstration that about \$1,000 had been subscribed to the Whelan monument, and that the promoters of the movement are quite willing, on a like sum being subscribed for a monument to Mr. Coles, to join the two funds and erect one monument to both. This seems an entirely fair proposal, and we shall be glad to learn that it can be carried into full effect.

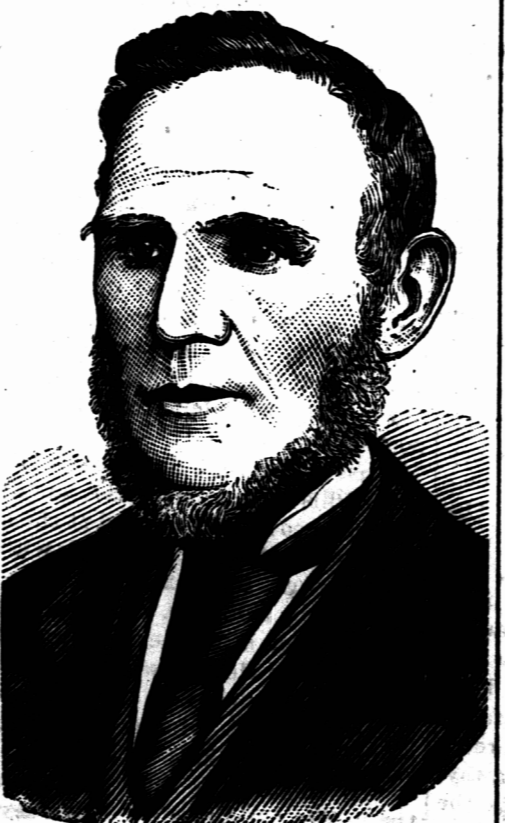
**WHELAN DEMONSTRATION.**

he sat down amid the plaudits of that House he had given utterance to a great speech.

Last week we were called to witness a most imposing and solemn ceremony, the unveiling of a monument sacred to the memory of two of our boys whose blood had empurpled the African veldts. For the honor and glory of the flag and of their Island home they laid down their young lives. No greater pledge, no stronger testimony of their love of country could they give and a grateful people have justly tendered a fitting homage to their valor.

Yet it is true that no less courage, no less heroism is oftentimes required to fight the battles of peace than those of war. That man who animated by a pure, disinterested love of country wears out his life to better the condition of his fellow-men, and never daunted by the jeers nor disheartened by the ingratitude of men, is ever ready when duty calls striving day by day that right and justice may triumph, that man, I say, is a hero no less deserving of our admiration, no less worthy of our highest praise, having no less claims to our gratitude than he who amid the din and clash of arms falls in honorable battle. Such a man was the Hon. Edward Whelan. Let his monument rise to proclaim to the world that we P. E. Islanders know how to appreciate true worth and true greatness. Let it rise, grand and majestic, to attest to generations yet unborn that their fathers were not ungrateful. Let it rise as a memorial of our liberties and free institutions, for with these the name and the life of Hon. Edward Whelan are and shall ever remain intimately associated.



**HON. J. C. UNDERHAY.**

A life long friend of the late Honorable Edward Whelan. Mr. Underhay spoke at the Demonstration yesterday.

At the close of Dr. Gauthier's address he was presented with a bouquet of flowers picked from the grave of the late Edward Whelan by his widow, residing in Charlottetown.

Among those on the platform were His Lordship Bishop McDonald, Dr. Gauthier, Judge Warburton, James Paton, Horace Hassard, Hon. J. C. Underhay, D. Nicholson, Dr. R. McNeill, Dr. F. F. Kelly, P. J. Trainor, Peter McCourt, P. J. Edmonds and others.

Dr. Gauthier was followed by Hon. J. C. Underhay, Bay Fortune, a life long friend and supporter of the Hon. Edward Whelan.

Mr. Underhay referred to the eloquent eulogy of Dr. Gauthier who had preceded him. Of Edward Whelan he could say no more loyal, or more devoted man did he ever meet. He was inspired by an earnest, sincere desire to promote his country's good. Mr. Underhay spoke of the monument movement and offered a further contribution of \$20 when the work of erecting the monument was begun.

Peter McCourt voiced the regret of those present that Premier Peters, Alex. Martin, J. A. Mathieson and others were unable to be present. He explained the movement for the erection of the monument and the reason that the B. I. S. were allied with the project viz in order that it might be associated with some permanent organization.

Judge Warburton felt under a dead weight in having to follow Rev. Dr. Gauthier. He was much pleased with the sincere and eloquent words of admiration spoken by Mr. Underhay. He was much pleased that a joint monument was to be raised to Coles and Whelan—each was the
