Widely Sought Boxing Bout Here Monday

When two champions clash in any line of sport there are bound to be fireworks and thrills galore and such will be the case when the proud and mighty Tommy Bland of Toronto, holder of the Dominion lightweight boxing crown squares off against Bobby Allen of Westville, N.S., Maritime welterweight ruler at the Forum Monday night, October 26th in the main event of Prince Edward Island's boxing extravaganza. A card that is the finest ever to be staged east of Montreal, a card that was eagerly sought after throughout the entire Dominion and a card that was brought here through the efforts of Charlottetown's own Joe Jacobs, promoter Joey MacDonald, the man who has brought boxing up to new heights of popularity during the past three months, after years in the doldrums.

But enough for that. All an excited Maritime as well as Island young fan is interested in is the scrap itself and what a scrap it promises to be. Both Bland and Allen are in the best shape of their lives and sparring partners are having miserable sessions these days as the two main eventers go through their paces in widely scattered parts of the Dominion.

Bobby Allen, the clean cut likable Mariner is a much improved fighter these past two months, and coming down for the most important fight of his career Allen has the Maritimers solidly behind him. He is not fighting for Bland's name but rather his own Maritime title as at stake and before he parts with the Westville fighter will give every ounce of courage and stamina he possesses. But Allen and his followers have no idea of doing any parting with anything and are quite confident of taking Bland into camp to add to his fine record in his last eighteen fights. Bland in which he has been reigned the winner 14 times with another battle even.

That is only the headline on the card. Down through the semi-final and prelims the card is dotted with headlines in Maritime circles pitted against our own Charlottetown boys. There is going to be a lot of clever boxing interspersed with heavy hitting in the squared circle Monday night and if the big capacity crowd then we will be our guess.

Rumors Fly Re Future Owners Of Americans; Court Action May Follow

NEW YORK, Oct. 20—(CP)—Amidst a flock of rumors concerning future ownership of New York Americans and possibility of legal action by owner Bill Dwyer, Sr., to retain the team, Marty Shenker, business manager, today loosed a verbal blast against the National Hockey League.

Eddie Shore, all-star defenceman of Boston Bruins; Tom Yawkey, millionaire owner of Boston Red Sox of the American Baseball League; various unnamed syndicates; Dan Topping, President of Brooklyn Dodgers pro football team and George Marshall, owner of Boston Redskins pro grid squad, were named banded about as potential future owners of the National League's hapless Americans.

Shenker charged the League had no right to assume the franchise of the Americans despite the club's financial indebtedness to it.

"If the League goes ahead with its plans to sell the team, we will fight the action in the courts," he said.

The League's Board of Governors yesterday declared the American franchise forfeited through failure of the club to comply with the league's demand for payment of the Americans' debt. Manager Mervin "Red" Dutton was named to continue at the helm of the club with President Frank Calder of the N. H. L. acting in an advisory capacity.

Shenker said he had talked to Dwyer, principal owner of the Amerks who is in Miami, and that Dwyer had already consulted counsel.

Shenker said the club management would take no action until the League actually tried to put the Americans on the ice. The star spangled pucksters are scheduled to swing into action at Chicago Nov. 7.

Shenker frankly admitted the club was in debt, not only to the League but to other sources. It was known the N. H. L. advanced \$18,000 to pay players' back-salaries last spring and unofficial estimates placed the total debt of the club at around \$200,000.

Shenker admitted he believed the League could do what it liked with the franchise, transferred here from Hamilton, Ont., in 1925 to introduce big time hockey to New York, but he contended it did not have the right to bargain with the players. He said they were "employees of the club. They legally belong to us, not the League."

N. H. L. Refs For Pre Season Hockey Series

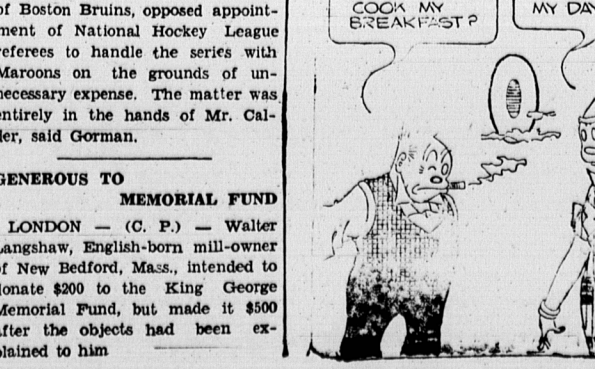
MONTREAL, Oct. 20—(CP)—The Montreal Maroons-Boston Bruins exhibition hockey series in the Maritime Provinces next week will be refereed by officials appointed by Frank Calder, National Hockey League President, or there will be no games, Tommy Gorman, Maroons' manager said today.

"I am taking the team to the Maritimes Sunday on the understanding Mr. Calder will appoint the referees," Gorman said. Maroons' management would take no chances of having their players "chopped to bits" because of poor refereeing, the manager remarked.

Last year Canadians suffered the loss of several players during an exhibition trip to the Maritimes and, according to Gorman, after a pre-season series in Winnipeg two years ago, Maroons came out "black and blue." In both cases local officials handled the whistles.

It was reported in Saint John last night that Art Ross, manager of Boston Bruins, opposed appointment of National Hockey League referees to handle the series with Maroons on the grounds of unnecessary expense. The matter was entirely in the hands of Mr. Calder, said Gorman.

Cards Manager Is Pessimistic Over Outlook

NEW YORK, Oct. 20—The acquisition of Lonnie Warneke has helped but not solved St. Louis Cardinals pitching problem, Frankie Frisch, manager of the Cards, said yesterday.

Getting Warneke doesn't tell me how Paul Dean will go next year," Frisch said.

"I don't know what's wrong with Paul now, but I think his trouble is in his head. Maybe he's got too much money."

Ready to pack south in a fishing trip, Frankie was jovially pessimistic.

"Sure I think Warneke will help us or I wouldn't have been in favor of the deal, but we still need some pitching."

Frisch referred to the trade that sent first baseman Jim "Ripper" Collins and pitchers Leroy Parmelee to Chicago Cubs for Warneke. He said both Warneke and Parmelee have been troubled by injuries in the last year and are therefore unknown quantities.

Frisch said he also had some doubts about the ability of Johnny Mize, his young first baseman, who played in 126 games and batted .329 last season.

"That boy's got plenty to learn," he declared. "He has to find out what to do with his feet. He's too slow."

"I'm not satisfied with my second baseman either," Frisch laughed. "He's getting pretty old. But I'll play a few games just the same."

St. Stephen May Enter Hockey Team

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 20—(CP)—Admission of St. Stephen into the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League with Fredericton, Saint John and Moncton was favored at a meeting tonight of the Capital hockey club executive, providing the border town club could guarantee to place a strong team on the ice. The admission of St. Stephen would make a four team loop with Moncton, replacing St. Andrews, representing the only change in the league, as operated last year.

Christy Walsh, business manager of the Yankees' home run king, heard they're going to produce a series of Tarzan pictures in the United States cinema capital and with the veteran Tarzan, Johnny Westmuller, reported on the sidelines he suggested the home run king for the role.

"Afraid of animals?" asked Lou. "No! At least I'm not afraid of Tigers—I've faced many of 'em in 12 years of baseball—But those lions, well we'll have to wait and see."

Gehrig's movie venture is a nebulous stage. Walsh wrote Sol Lesser, Hollywood producer, who said, they'd never seen Lou other than in a flannel baseball suit. So pictures now are in the mail.

Lou said he was interested, financially and artistically. He supposes they'll try and work in something about baseball. But just what and how in a jungle setting he can't say.

Since the former subway brakeman deftly polished off Eric Seelig with a startling one-round knockout last week to place himself definitely on the list of title contenders, offers for his services have poured in from every direction.

Even the far west is bidding for a glimpse of the lad whose hitting power is compared to that of the Brown Bomber, weights considered.

Jacobs, who tied Louis to a long term contract the moment the negro showed signs of developing into a box office attraction, has done the same with Balsamo.

For the next five years the Italian will do all his fighting for Jacobs.

Balsamo is owned and managed by two New York business men, but it will be up to the head of the 20th Century Sporting Club to say when, where and whom the youngster fights.

Balsamo will go to the post in the New York Hippodrome Oct. 28th, against Babe Risco, former middleweight champion. After that he will be booked for headline fights in other cities.

Russ Blinco and Bob Gracie shaped up well in the field. Stew Evans arrived from Detroit in time to get in the game and is expected to come to terms with Maroons tomorrow.

Maroons are still awaiting definite word from Lionel Conacher. He has been on a hunting trip in Northern Ontario and has not yet signed his contract.

Dutton Drives Team Through Stiff Workout

OSHAWA, Ont., Oct. 20—(CP)—Learning definitely that the National Hockey League had taken over the franchise of their club, New York Americans went through another stiff workout here today paying little apparent attention to the change in the club's status.
