EASTER DISPLAY IN THE MARKET

Continued from page 9 may be classed as neither look advantage of the opportunity to inspect the carcasses, the unanimous opinion being that a finer display had not been seen for many a long day.

Messrs. Saunders and Newsom, whose market stand cannot be surpassed in any other province for its cleanliness and strict observance of the laws of hygiene, have a tempting display to "cloy the hungry desire of the appetite by the bare imagination of a feast." Six carcasses of beef are on hand, besides mutton, pork and veal in galore. One carcass of a heifer bred by Mr. Malcolm Bell of Crapaud, is noted for being exceptionally well finished, and attracted special attention from the trade as well as breeders.

Other animals of outstanding quality were those from Mr. James E. Macdonald, North Bedeque, Mr. Adam Robertson, Victoria, both exhibitors coming in for a great deal of admiration on account of their very choice quality. Among the carcasses of mutton, of which there is a brave array, one deserving special mention was sent by Mr. Wm. H. Inman, Hampton.

Messrs. Blake Bros.' display as usual attracted a great deal of attention. Here also were six carcasses of beef meriting the encomiums of the experts, one from Ontario weighing 1,000 lbs. dressed, and another 950 lbs. The former was placed first at the recent Short Course exhibition; while the latter was bred by Mr. John McNeill. Other fine exhibits came from Mr. Frank Bell, Royalty, and Mr. John McDonald, Lot 48, the former sending a pair of three-year-old heifers weighing 700 lbs. each, and the latter a pair weighing 650 lbs. each. The first lamb of the season is on display here, weighing 90 lbs. dressed. This is exceptionally good weight for so early in the season. Messrs. Blake also have hanging in a row seven champion turkeys weighing 130 lbs., three of them averaging 23 lbs. These were sent by Mrs. Richard Bagnell, Hazel Grove, and are fit to place before a king.

Messrs. Drake & Co., which was formerly styled F. L. Drake, have also made special endeavors to excel previous exhibits, and have succeeded. Prominently displayed were two heifers, weighing respectively 780 lbs. and 707 lbs., and two steers weighing 780 lbs. and 760 lbs., all of which were fed by Mr. Howard Toombs of North Rustico. This is early for lambs, as already mentioned, but this firm have displayed four beauties averaging 20 lbs. to 25 lbs. It may be mentioned that the new partners of this firm are Mr. J. Stanley Wedlock and Mr. H. J. Harris who have had extensive experience in both the buying and retail business.

Altogether the exhibition deserves to be seen to be fully appreciated, and there is sure to be a large attendance of both sexes to envy if not to buy. It is true that God sends us the meat, the devil the cooks, it will only be the latter to blame if everyone who can afford it has not both the stomach and the food for his Easter feast to-morrow.

The sun sets this evening at 6.16, tomorrow at 6.17 and Monday at 6.18; it rises tomorrow morning at 5.56; Monday at 5.54 and Tuesday at 5.52.

SAD DEATH.—Mrs. Lottie G. Offer, widow of the late James Offer, Charlottetown, has received the sad news of the death in New York on Tuesday last of her only son Edward, aged 38. The deceased who was a marine engineer, left Charlottetown about 14 years ago. He last visited his native city in 1905. He leaves a widow in New York, besides his mother in this city to mourn. The remains left New York for the Island Wednesday.

Jenkins represented Miss Canada and was supported by a number of young ladies and gentlemen, who gave a most entertaining and instructive welcome to the strangers within the gates. The costumes used were well gotten up and this part formed a good closing for a very interesting evening. To Mr. Webster is due the credit for erecting the fine arch and the decorations. It is expected the arch will be in place to-morrow.
