The correspondent of the Manitoba Free Press, who has followed on their trail tells of the print of naked feet in the snow and mud, of their shivering beside their scant camp fire, some sick and refusing medicine, and here and there one absolutely demented yet one and all resolutely refusing to turn back.

**THE DOUKHOBOR MARCH.**

One of the many branches of the Canadian Pacific Railway extending west-northwestward from Winnipeg, passes through Portage la Prairie, Gladstone, Neepawa, Salteaux, Binscarth and Harrowby, then crosses the Manitoba boundary into Assiniboia and thence northward to its terminus at Yorkton. It was from their settlement near Crooked Lake, 28 miles from Yorkton, that the Doukhobor enthusiasts set out on their strange pilgrimage which has since attracted so much attention. They started on Sunday afternoon, October 26, and made their first day's march of eight miles. At this time their numbers were variously reported as from 1600 to 1800 souls, men, women and children. Here the women and children were detained and housed by the authorities, and the men, some five or six hundred in number, marched on, following a course parallel with the railway. Down to November 2nd they had marched a distance of 92 miles to Millwood and crossed the boundary into the Province of Manitoba.

It is gratifying to learn that the Christian people along the route have been liberal in their supplies of food. Some of the poor deluded ones will not take the food offered them. Others accept it gratefully as a gift from God who had moved the hearts of the donors to bestow it. One meal on the march is thus described:  
At the little stream the pilgrims halted. Many bathed their faces. Then the party divided itself in two nearly equal portions, about fifteen feet apart. One of them started a psalm in which all joined reverently. Then another stepped forward and commenced the chanting of a creed or some verse from Scripture, all as before repeating them with the leader. Then the party bowed three times, the foreheads touching the dust with each salutation; the other party doing likewise. This concluded their midday devotions.  
So the two-mile long procession moved on, slowly, only pausing to partake of scant food, to worship or to sleep. One writer describes it as "the path of honest delusion, through deepening doubt to darkest despair." It is all very strange and very sad.

Their immediate destination is Winnipeg, which, however, they will not be permitted to reach, as according to our despatches, they are to be stopped by the Mounted Police, placed in the cars, by force if necessary, and shipped back to Yorkton and thence conveyed back to their community settlement at Crooked Lake. It is more than probable that they will offer some mild resistance in order to compel the authorities to use force, and so be able to take to themselves the credit of being "persecuted for righteousness sake." The poor "Spirit-wrestlers," as they call themselves, were much persecuted in Russia and many careful observers of their recent proceedings think they seem to court persecution in Canada. Be that as it may their strange case calls for pity and commiseration at the hands of all who cherish a feeling of human brotherhood.  
Down to this season they were doing well in their new homes and rapidly surrounding themselves with some of the comforts of life. Then, through the agency of a preacher of their sect recently arrived from Russia, they were moved to new acts of self-denial and finally to discard altogether the use of animals in work and of animal food in any form. They turned their horses, cattle and sheep loose, believing that they belonged to God, and had the same right to full liberty that men and women have. It became necessary for the authorities to take charge of the deserted animals, to save their lives during the coming winter, and they were sold for the benefit of their former owners. The religious zeal and enthusiasm of these people seemed to grow after their renunciation of clothes and food which were the product of the animal tripe. Then it was that they conceived the notion of going on a pilgrimage "to meet Jesus."  
So they set out, clothed in cotton garments and with rubber footwear, or barefooted, to tramp across the prairie until He should meet them. They believed that they were literally "leaving all to follow Him." If any were hungry He would



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
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
