NEW COOKERY BOOK

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—The reading of two cookery books each written by a man and a woman has been the pastime of a learned reviewer in "The Times" lately. Of Paul Reboux's book of new French cookery the reviewer writes that his meals were more interesting to read about than to eat. "I proclaim the right to divorce in the realm of cookery," says M. Reboux, who considers the alliance of beef steak with potatoes, veal with green peas and a leg of mutton with haricot beans are mere marriages of convenience that should be broken by the courageous cook. "Be curious and keep your minds on the alert!" is the advice he gives equally to the maker and the eater of meals. "Don't go to sleep in a bed of custom. Think out new flavorings and ingenious combinations," and his menus certainly bear out his claim to ingenuity. He detests simplicity; for him a smooth, silky sauce must be given a touch of the unexpected in the shape of something which he designates by the untranslatable word croquant, seeds, raspings of bread and shavings of cheese; his veal must be flavoured with fish.

He believes, too, in psycho-analysis his guests and providing meals to suit their complex, a point of view which raises an interesting problem in hospitality. Should the perfect host study his guests' tastes so that his meal becomes the sort of thing they might order at a restaurant, or should he give them actually of himself by impressing his own personality on his dinner. Mrs. Lucas's book the French Cookery is most praiseworthy; behind her great knowledge of the technique of cooking is a fine technique of life, which makes her understand the value of simplicity as M. Reboux cannot, and gives her hospitality that unforced personal note which is so desirable. She has a great deal to say about the lazy English habit of shopping by telephone, and points out the work of the finest cook can be spoiled by the haphazard shopper.

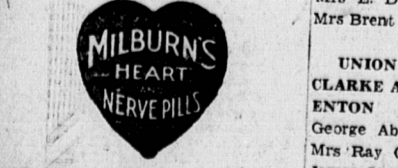
