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Death Follows In Wake Of Tornado

ANDERSON WILL HANG TOMORROW

Cabinet, Having Reviewed His Case, Decided That There Would Be No Interference With The Verdict of The Trial Court.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 17.—The law will take its course in the case of Eric Anderson, who stands sentenced to be hanged at Sydney, N. S., on Tuesday next for murder. The cabinet having reviewed the case decided that there would be no interference with the verdict of the trial court. It was announced today. There has been allegations regarding the mental condition of the condemned man, but examination has established him as sane, it was declared.

SYDNEY, N. S., May 17.—Ingvold "Bing" Anderson, alias Emmet Sloane, whose appeal for commutation was refused at Ottawa today after review by the Federal Cabinet, was sentenced to hang at Sydney on May 20 for the murder in a local hotel early in February of Debius Rehberg, night clerk. Report British Columbian Liberal is to Get New Portfolio.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 18.—The Province today publishes the following:

International Bank Opens

The International Bank, the name by which it is most commonly known, will serve as the business end of the Young Plan and will act as trustee for the creditor powers in the final and definite liquidation of the world war reparations problem.

ENGLAND'S GREAT AIRSHIP WILL SOON REACH PORT OF MONTREAL

FEEBLE GESTURE TO BRITISH PREFERENCE

OTTAWA, Ont., May 17.—The Dunning Budget which he characterized as a feeble gesture to British preference in its weakness in regard to the general progress and expansion of Canada and its trade, was the subject of an address by Hon. H. H. Stevens, M. P., before the Ottawa Womens' Conservative Association last night. If there is one country among all the others of the world with a wonderful future ahead it should be Canada. Mr. Stevens told the meeting: "We should have made more progress since the war than any other. We should have latent wealth greater than any other area in minerals, farm lands and in other respects, but we have actually lost men and money and that fact alone should stagger the people of Canada." The effect the Dunning Budget would have on internal trade through its advocacy of foreign trade was a deleterious one, Mr. Stevens thought.

R-100 Expected Early In June—No Passengers On Maiden Voyage—Major Scott, Of R-34 Fame, Will Command Dirigible.

LONDON, May 18.—In the early days of June, the good citizens of Montreal may expect to behold the giant bulk of R. 100 floating high above them as she rests with her nose securely harnessed to the mooring mast which the Canadian Government has hospitably provided at the St. Hubert airport. The great airship, last minor repairs completed, is due to essay the flight from her home at Cardington, near Bedford, about the end of May. This will be the first crossing of the Atlantic by a British airship since R. 34 flew from England to New York and back 11 years ago.

For months past the Air Ministry has been flooded with applications for reservations on this maiden journey. Every applicant, outside an extremely narrow circle of officials and technical experts, will be disappointed. There will not be a single "ordinary" passenger. C. N. R. Train Kills 10 Of Holstein Herd

BROCKVILLE, May 17.—When C. N. R. train no. 10, eastbound, was nearing Morrisburg and running half an hour late Wednesday, it struck a herd of Holstein cattle owned by James Robinson, killing ten of them and entailing a loss of approximately \$1,500. Mr. Robinson had noticed the fast train go past his farm at the regular hour and expected that the local had gone before it and started his herd for the pasture. The engineer of the train was badly battered up by the impact when it struck the cows.
The locomotive was literally drenched in blood from the remains of the animals. The remains had to be buried by section men of the railway company.

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BITTER RACIAL FEELING IN TEXAS TOWN

Negro Tenant Farmer Killed By Mob After He Murdered White Land Owner.

HONEY GROVE, Tex., May 17.—Bitter racial feeling swept this small farming community today after the second outburst of mob violence in Texas within a week. Within a few hours after Sam Johnson, young negro tenant farmer had shot and killed E. F. Fortenberry, fifty, white land owner, a mob of 400 men besieged the negro in his cabin and riddled his body with bullets. Then, after chaining the body to an automobile and dragging it through the negro section, the throng strung it from a tree, soaked it with gasoline and set it ablaze.

Although negro residents remained within their cabins and shantys today fearful of further violence, Sheriff Hughes of Bonham, said order had been restored among the 900 residents so that no assistance from the National Guard would be necessary, he believed.

TORNADO KILLS EIGHT AND INJURES MANY

FLAINE, Ark., May 18.—A tornado, which struck west of here early today demolished the town of Labrook, about nine miles west of here, killing eight negroes and injuring an undetermined number. All available ambulances from Helena, Ark., have been dispatched into the tornado area to remove the dead and injured. Detailed reports were unavailable, all communications being cut off.

Anniversary Of The Relief Of Mafeking

TORONTO, Ont., May 17.—Toronto today observed the thirtieth anniversary of the "Relief of Mafeking," when Colonel Baden Powell and his little garrison of 900 civilians who had held the town since October 12 against a superior force were relieved. The garrison had begun to despair of relief as the months passed, when Colonel Mahon with his small, but mobile force appeared and with the aid of the besieged drove the Boer forces into retreat.

MILITIA AND POLICE ARE IN CONTROL

Situation In India Becoming Quieter—Martial Law Will Probably Be Abrogated Next Saturday.

SHOLAPURA India May 18.—Police and soldiers at dawn today raided the village of Valhand, about 12 miles from here, and arrested ten men wanted for their part in the recent rioting here. Commission Is Named

REGINA, Sask., May 18.—Mr. Justice James McKay, Chairman; Mr. Justice P. E. MacKenzie, and Mr. Justice J. F. L. Embury, the two former of the Court of Appeal and the latter of the King's Bench, were named Saturday as the personnel of the Royal Commission to investigate the charges of maladministration by the late Gardner Government and directed by Hon. J. F. Bryant at the last session of Legislative Assembly. Making this announcement, Hon. M. A. MacPherson, Attorney General stated that the Commission would function forthwith and that the date of the sittings will be announced later.

Rev. J. W. Manning Passes Away

Manning, D.D., Chairman of the Board of Governors of Acadia University, second oldest graduate of that University, and for many years an outstanding figure in the Baptist Church in Canada, died this morning in his eighty-ninth year. Rev. Dr. Manning was born in Bridgewater January 18th, 1842, and was a member of the Acadia graduating class of 1867. TO OPPOSE KING OVER STATEMENT

Ontario Government to Throw Whole Weight Into Federal Campaign.

LONDON, Ont., May 18.—The Ontario Government will throw its whole weight into the Dominion election campaign in protest against the utterance of Premier W. L. Mackenzie King in the House of Commons that he would not "give a five-cent piece" for unemployment relief to a province governed by a Conservative provincial administration.

In making this announcement before the Western Ontario Conservative convention today, Premier G. Howard Ferguson stated that his administration had been "driven in" to the election by reason of the statement of the Prime Minister who he charged, had "degraded" his office.

The Prime Minister of Canada, Premier Ferguson declared, "said to the public on the floor of the House of Commons, that unless you vote as I say, you are not entitled to any advantage that may come from the Dominion treasury." When a Prime Minister so degrades the position he occupies as to stoop to a lower level of public morality than I have ever heard in this country or any other country, particularly Anglo-Saxon, as to say he will not give a five-cent piece unless you support him and his party, that is a lowering of public morality that the Canadian people will resent more than they will resent the tariff issue. I believe that issue is much more important today than any problem for the country."
