THE TARIFF AND THE COST OF LIVING.

Some of our party-political contemporaries are in disagreement as to whether or not the present tariff is in any way responsible for the increased cost of living. As this is a matter which concerns every consumer in the land it may very properly be considered by the press of the country whether Liberal, Conservative or Independent. We have reached the conclusion that the tariff is a material factor in adding to the cost of living, for reasons which we shall give.

Any one at all familiar with the Canadian tariff is aware that it is mainly an ad valorem tariff, that is a tariff based on the value of the goods imported. Specific duties, that is duties based on quantities, are the exception rather than the rule. It is also a well known fact that the importer charges a certain percentage on the cost of the goods with freight and duty added, and that the retailer in turn charges a larger percentage on the price which he pays to the wholesale merchant for his goods.

Now let us see how this works out. Take an invoice of imported goods valued for duty at \$100, the duty being 30 per cent. The goods cost the importer \$130. Let us suppose the importer adds a modest 15 per cent for handling and profit on these goods and this will make the price to the retailer \$149.50. The retailer in turn adds, say, 25 per cent for handling and profit and this makes the price to the consumer \$186.88.

Now let us suppose the same goods which formerly cost \$100 have in the foreign market advanced in price to \$150. The duty at the same rate of 30 per cent will now be \$45, the cost to the importer \$195, and with the importer's 15 per cent added, the cost to the retailer will be \$224.25. To this the retailer will add his 25 per cent and the cost to the consumer will be \$280.31. Deduct from this the cost of the first bill of goods to consumer, as above stated, \$186.88, and we find the consumer is paying \$93.43 more than before.

From this \$93.43 we deduct the increased first cost of \$50 in the foreign market and we have \$43.43 chargeable to the tariff, the importer and the retailer. The Government gets \$15, or 50 per cent more than before; the importer gets 15 per cent on \$195 instead of 15 per cent on \$130, or \$9.75 more, and the retailer gets 25 per cent on \$224.25 instead of 25 per cent on \$149.50 or \$18.06 more. Of the increased cost \$21.66 is directly due to the tariff, of which \$15 goes to the Government, \$2.25 to the importer and \$4.31 to the retail merchant.

Our Liberal friends should not forget what was all along argued by the Liberal leaders and the Liberal press, that the tariff on imported goods not only raises the price of such imported goods to the consumer, but also to a large extent governs the price of goods manufactured in the country. If they will now admit the soundness of this doctrine they will readily see that the tariff is at present a very important factor in making high prices higher all round.

VACCINATION.

Smallpox exists in every Province of Canada. As usual, the disease has assumed a mild form during the summer and is becoming more virulent with the approach of cold weather. Of the four cases now in the Quarantine Hospital in this City one is very serious and the patient is not expected to recover. There are a considerable number of cases scattered about the country districts of this Province. The one known preventive is vaccination.

tion. The Provincial Government has very properly taken action for the general enforcement of the Vaccination Act of 1888. The law requires that all unvaccinated persons of the age of three months or upwards shall be vaccinated, and that children under twelve years of age must be brought by parents or guardians to the proper officer to be vaccinated.

Parents are liable to a penalty of five dollars in each case of neglect or refusal to see that their children are vaccinated. Teachers are required to see that no unvaccinated child shall attend school, and every teacher is liable to a penalty of five dollars for every case of neglect or refusal to enforce this provision.

There has been shameful laxity in Canada with regard to the necessity of vaccination. The Canada Lancet affirms that there are more cases of smallpox now in Toronto than occur in the German Empire in a year. This is because vaccination is rigidly enforced in Germany and neglected in Canada.

The Government is to be commended for the determination to insist on a general vaccination. It is only in that way that the disease can be stamped out. If vigorous measures are not now taken we shall again have the experience of having all churches schools and places of amusement and resort closed to the public.

General vaccination is necessary for the preservation of life, for the stamping out of a loathsome disease, and for maintaining our open schools, churches and places

of resort. It must be insisted upon and enforced with a firm hand, and if this is done the disgraceful conditions of past years will be avoided.

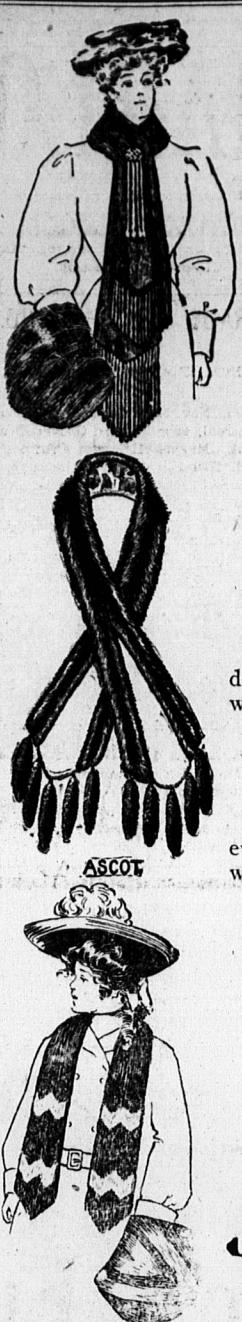

Compulsory Vaccination.

For the purpose of guarding against the further spread of smallpox, the Provincial Government has appointed superintendents of Vaccination in and for the various districts throughout the Province with the object of carrying out the provisions of the Act which requires that all unvaccinated persons of the age of three months and upwards must be vaccinated. Refusing or neglecting to comply with the law subjects a person to a fine of five dollars and costs. The same amount may be collected every two months if the person persists in refusing to be vaccinated. 11-11d2t
