TALES TOLD BY MEN IN THE FIGHTING LINES

The Cornwall Freeholder publishes the following interesting letter from the husband of a lady in that town who is serving the King as Commander of a gunboat and fleet of trawlers in the North and British Channel: "Perhaps you would like to hear of the special convoy job we had in conjunction with the H.M.S. We had 20 special armored vessels of about 500 tons of light draft. Each was armed with a six pounder in the bow, and quite a lot of quick firers in various positions on deck, and upon the bridges, and after deck erections for tackling the enemy's submarines and their special motor-driver surface boats by way of the rivers and canals. "As you are doubtless aware the French and Belgian countries are simply intersected with canals; not such splendid waterways as in Canada, but equally well equipped and managed in a more miniature style. "Upon certain of these waters which had, in the earlier stages of the war, fallen into the German hands and was doubtless part of the original plan of the Kaiser's to get to Calais, they are accumulating great quantities of such suitable craft as will enable them not only to fight our troops in the trenches but will be of immense service in effecting a successful raid upon our coasts where the distances are not of much purport. "Now our little exploit comes in. This news has never leaked out, nor the success our armored flotilla have achieved. This only goes to show that the British do not brag of such undertakings. Mind you I do not altogether agree with such strict censorship after you have once got in at the enemy with a new device. "As we all know the determined efforts the Germans are making to capture both American and Canadian merchant ships some counter move should be taken to the German end of it, all events minimize the talk of and often wished-for anticipatory victories which the Kaiser and his myrmidons scream forth with hrdlu mtwyp vbgkq dream of. "But there I am wondering. It was before dawn on a dull, gloomy day that we set out. Only, I think, some two persons (one being the Admiral of the Base, and his Chief) knew of our departure. Even the officers and crews of the flotilla were in ignorance of their destination, there only being the Commodore on board the ship. I will call Z (one of the flotilla) knew; the H.M.S. was senior ship and lead. "My ship was whipped in and had the ubiquitous kind of duty to keep the stragglers from falling astern. This was not so bad during daylight, but when night came it was more a kind of instinct which enabled one to find them in the dark. It ended by taking some in tow. "As it was, we fell some four or five miles astern when I signalled (by wireless, of course) in secret code. However, by dint of encouraging talk to certain of the flotilla and with

THE EXPANSIVE FORCE OF ICE.

In the transaction of the Royal Society of Canada appears a paper by Messrs. H. T. Barnes, J. W. Hayward and Norman M. McLeod, which contains some very useful information on the expansive force of ice, a matter of very great importance in engineering work in Canada. Allowance for the frost of the ice sheet has been the subject of considerable diversity of opinion, and the conclusions which these gentlemen have reached as a result of their studies, as yet of a preliminary nature, of ice expansion, will be found interesting: (1) The crushing strength of ice is most probably 400 pounds per square inch. (2) An ice block will yield under pressure at approximately 200 pounds per square inch, probably due to the slipping of the crystals. (3) An ice sheet will form cracks on the upper and under surface due to unequal strain. (4) A permanent expansion may result if the cracks become filled and frozen. (5) According to the most trustworthy results of other observers, the ice frozen to concrete develops its full crushing strength, and the tensile strength of ice is under 200 pounds per square inch.
