NEW YORK, Sept. 21 (AP)—The stock market Saturday ended a generally unsatisfactory week with an extension of the sharp decline of the previous session. While a number of favorites managed to emerge with modest advances, small fractional recessions were widespread at the close.

Bearishness persisted over war bulletins telling of fresh Nazi successes in Russia, brokers said, and, while Wall Street inclined to the belief the Reds still had a chance, few were willing to take on additional commitments.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 2 of a point and on the week showed a net decline of 1. Rails, steels, motors, mail orders, rubbers, oils and coppers held to a slim groove but minus signs predominated in these groups.

Unchanged to lower were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Western Union, American Telephone, Santa Fe, Great Northern, Anaconda, Kennecott, U. S. Rubber, Sears Roebuck, Woolworth, J. I. Case, Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, Allied Chemical, Union Carbide, Standard Oil (N.J.), and Johns-Manville.

Canadian issues were mainly lower. Seagrams, and Canadian Pacific lost 1-8 each while International Nickel was down 1-4 and Walkers 1-2. Dome Mines were up 1-8.

A similar condition prevailed on the curb where Canadian Colonial Airlines were off 3-8, Imperial Oil 1-8 and Lake Shore 3-8. Ford of Canada was up 1-4.

Expect debate On Dominions In War Cabinet

LONDON, Sept. 19 (CP)—Dominion representation in the war cabinet probably will be debated during the current session of Parliament. Suggested previously in Parliamentary debates, the proposal came to the fore during the recess when all Australian parties urged such representation.

The British government is understood to view the whole question of Dominion representation with an open mind. But it is a situation bristling with constitutional difficulties. Political observers ask, for instance, whether a Prime Minister could lead his warring country from London or if a minister were sent instead would that minister be given plenary powers to bind his government to decisions made.

Prime Minister MacKenzie King opposes an imperial war cabinet because he considers the present system of consultation satisfactory. South Africa apparently shares his view.

As a solution the Times in a leading article proposed making the Dominion secretary a full-fledged member of the war cabinet and naming Dominion premiers ex officio with right to attend meetings instead of being invited as they are now.

Proponents of imperial representation argue that presence of Dominion representatives would speed decisions. These supporters of imperial representation point to the first imperial war cabinet of the first great war to buttress their case. Students of political history report, however, that it was not a continuously-sitting body. It met first in 1917, sat for two months and no further sessions were held until 1918.

Sir Robert Borden, Canada's wartime premier, called it "a cabinet of governments." Every premier was responsible to his own cabinet and Parliament.

Discussing imperial representation under the heading "commonwealth dilemma," the Economist said the reason for the present divergence of opinion on the system of collaboration "lies in the very different effects which the course of the war had on each Dominion."

"Australia and New Zealand—which subscribe to Australia's views about imperial representation though less clamorously—have suffered heavily in Greece and China and are constantly in the fighting in other parts of the near east," the weekly said.

"Australia, in addition, now is directly threatened by Japan. Strategic decisions taken by the British cabinet have thus cost Australia and New Zealand many lives and may at any moment cost them more. Canadian troops on the other hand, have not yet been in action. South African troops have played a part in the East Africa campaign. But that campaign was successful so South Africa has apparently decided with Canada that the present system of imperial consultation is adequate."

The Economist added it "would be a pity" if Australia's struggles will be no need for constitution making.
