HOW PRIVATE JACK McLEAN MET HIS DEATH.

Mrs. McLean, Richmond Street, City, has received the following letter giving particulars of the death of her son, Private John McLean:— At the Front, Belgium, Charlottetown, P. E. I., October 19th, 1915. Mrs. Esth McLean, Dear Mrs. McLean: It is with the deepest regret that I write to tell you of the death of your son Private John McLean, No. 4 platoon, "A" company, 26 Battalion, who was killed in action on Wednesday, Oct. 13th.

"A" company was ordered to attack a position of the men composing the first line—a post of honor—as only the best were selected for this duty. Unfortunately he was among those who fell. His body was recovered after night had fallen and now lies in the little cemetery of the 26th Battalion in rear of the lines of trenches. He is much missed by his former comrades in "A" company, where he was much liked on account of his many good qualities and cheerful and bright disposition. He was one of the men directly under my charge as I have been in command of No. 4 platoon since leaving England. I always thought a great deal of him. He was always to be depended upon no matter what work we were called upon to do and I miss him sorely. He was a good soldier, a brave man who died fighting for his country, the noblest ending a man can meet with. With deepest sympathy, Believe me, Sincerely yours, A.
