HOME MARKET FOR ISLAND PRODUCTS KEYNOTE OF MR. BENNETT'S MESSAGE

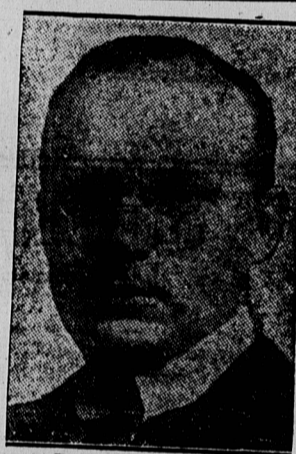
LARGEST AUDIENCE EVER ASSEMBLED IN SUMMER-SIDE TENDERS ENTHUSIASTIC OVATION TO CONSERVATIVE PARTY LEADER AND HEARS STIRRING SPEECH ON CAMPAIGN ISSUES OF THE DAY.

SUMMERSIDE, P. E. I., July 4.—(By Thomas Green, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent)—

Opening his Prince Edward Island campaign tour, Hon. R. B. Bennett here tonight caustically referred to the tariff attitude of the Liberal administration. At the same time, the Conservative Chieftain voiced his support for a Car Ferry service between the Garden of the Gulf and the Mainland. To trade treaties and the development of the basic industry of agriculture, he devoted considerable time.

Trade treaties of course, we want trade treaties he exclaimed, we want markets. How are you going to get them, well, not the way Mr. King has acted by being frightened of the other fellow. He said in Parliament that is not the way Laurier talked. But after the Prime Minister had made his don't provoke statement in the House of Commons, the Opposition leader went on, the Smoot-Hawley tariff was put into force with its detrimental effect on Canadian industry. Never were such words of commendation uttered by the people of the United States about Canadians, he proceeded, in recalling the Reciprocity pact of 1911. I. was the car ferry, given in the regime of Sir Robert Borden, Mr. Arnett asserted. Great Meeting At Mt. Stewart

McLure And Myers Heard To Excellent Advantage At Enthusiastic Conservative Meeting.

Driving home point after point in a manner that permitted of no contradiction, refuting numerous arguments propounded by their Liberal opponents to the satisfaction of a decidedly Conservative audience, receiving a well merited lion's share of applause, Messrs McLure and Myers Conservative candidates for Queens outfought, outwitted and outgeneralized the followers of Mackenzie King in a brisk political battle waged last evening at Mt. Stewart. The Liberal standard bearer, Dr. Cyrus Macmillan with Senator Sinclair, who substituted for Hon. R. H. Jenkins, left the field with their array of arguments decimated and, decidedly worsted at all points in both attack and defense.

Brazen Misrepresentation

Misrepresentation could scarcely go further than in the brazen denial by the local Liberal organ of a definite statement made by its own party leader, Premier Mackenzie King at Sydney and published in its own columns a few days ago. In its issue of yesterday The Patriot charges Dr. W. J. MacMillan, M. P., with making a "bad break" at the Morell meeting and in doing so deliberately misquotes the Prime Minister as reported on the front page of The Patriot on June 24th last. Here are the two statements in parallel columns. Let the electors judge whether it was Dr. W. J. MacMillan, or the Patriot newspaper, that made the "bad break!"

Patriot, July 4th

"Alluding to the report of the Duncan Commission and brandishing a copy of the Patriot... he (Dr. W. J. MacMillan) said Mr. Mackenzie King as reported in this paper, declared that the Duncan report had been implemented in every detail. This statement is false on the face of it, said the Doctor, and what dependence can you place in other statements he has made."

"THE FACT OF THE MATTER IS THAT MR. MACKENZIE KING DID NOT MAKE THE STATEMENT AS CHARGED BY DR. MACMILLAN NOR IS HE SO REPORTED IN THE PATRIOT. 'The Patriot did say that Mr. King said the recommendations had been carried out ALMOST TO THE VERY LETTER and in the spirit it was made."

Mr. King dealt with the record of the government and said:

"I STAND HERE TONIGHT AND SAY TO THE MARITIME PROVINCES THAT THERE IS NOT A MAJOR RECOMMENDATION IN THE DUNCAN REPORT, NOT A RECOMMENDATION OF ANY REAL SIGNIFICANCE TODAY, THAT WE HAVE NOT CARRIED OUT IN LETTER AND SPIRIT."

Meighen's Son Is Mentioned As Candidate

MONTREAL, Que., July 4.—Theodore Meighen son of Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, former Prime Minister of Canada was forecast today as a Conservative candidate in the district of Temiscouata in a Quebec City despatch to Montreal Leveleur. The despatch says that Hon. R. B. Bennett will preside in person at a Conservative convention in Temiscouata on July 11. Theodore Meighen is a lawyer graduate of Laval University at Quebec, where he practices his profession.

Death-Bed Repentance

In its eleventh-hour stampede to catch votes the Mackenzie King Government denounced the trade arrangement with New Zealand, which has proved so disastrous to the Canadian dairy industry; raised the duty on biscuit flour to \$2.03 a barrel; imposed surprisingly high duties on some steel products, while leaving others open to undue competition; placed countervailing duties upon sixteen out of twelve hundred tariff items; and brought down, in rapid succession, two contradictory sets of protective schedules on fruit and vegetables. The haste thus displayed by Ministers at the close of Parliament, to make peace with their judges, reminds us of what the late Goldwin Smith said about the final scene in the death chamber of Charles the Second. The Sage of the Grange described the monarch's confession as occupying half an hour, "a confession which, if at all complete, must have been highly condensed." So we feel, declares the Toronto Mail and Empire, that the Ottawa Government struck the sawdust trail to the penitent bench far too late in its career and with too much speed and confusion to satisfy public opinion to which it now appeals.

ENDURANCE FLIERS MAKE LANDING

Airmen Remain Over 23 Days In Air, Breaking Previous Record By 133 Hours.

SKY HARBOR AIRPORT, Chicago, Ill., July 4.—The endurance plane "city of Chicago" landed at 5.20 p. m. Central Standard Time after spending 853 hours and 40 minutes in the air breaking all previous records for sustained flight.

The landing was made unexpectedly after the fliers John and Kenneth Hunter had dropped a note with an urgent request for oil. Virtually unnoticed and unheralded the record breaking endurance flight began on June 11 at 3.40 p. m. Central Standard Time. The fliers and their second hand monoplane wiped out the old record of 420 hours and 21 1-2 minutes at 3.01.30 Sunday morning. Not satisfied with that accomplishment the Hunter boys soared on, piling hour after hour on their new record until their landing today. The old record had been set last July by Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien in their St. Louis Robin over Lambert Field, St. Louis, Mo.

The plane was within 100 feet of the ground before anyone noticed that it was landing. The ship was brought into the hangar which the crowd stormed and ganged in close-flying around. Kenneth Hunter, sitting in the cockpit was covered with oil and dirt. John remained in the ship after Kenneth was rushed to the hangar offices.

Smith Completes World's Flight

Three persons were reported injured.

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Judge Imposes Stiff Sentence

Four Years In Dorchester And the Lash Awarded Trio In Sydney Robbery.

SYDNEY, N. S., July 4.—Offenses of this sort are not to be tolerated in a civilized country, declared Mr. Justice Chisholm this morning in sentencing three men convicted of highway robbery. Henry Rideout, Sydney Rideout and Joseph Matheson to four years in Dorchester Penitentiary and the lash. It was the first time in the history of Nova Scotia that the lash had been imposed for robbery with violence.

The trio had been convicted of beating John R. Blue, Glouce Bay, merchant and robbing him of \$300. His Lordship ordered that the lashing take place during the last year of each prisoners sentence. He also ordered whipped, Bartling Kadsra of New Waterford, convicted of a serious offence. Henry Rideout uttered a dramatic protestation of innocence. I am being sentenced for something I know nothing about, he stated. He said he was crippled and on compensation allowance.

SARNIA, Ont., July 4.—Horribly burned when a large cooking still at the Imperial Oil Refinery exploded here today, Reg. B. Connors 37 and Wm. Gilbert, 37, were almost instantly killed. Five others were injured, one of whom is in a critical condition. The others are expected to recover. The first two were married.
