The canning industry in this Province should be started on a small scale, a conference in Charlottetown, sponsored by the Economic Survey Committee, was told by three representatives of the Continental Can Company of Canada. Limited on Wednesday. Reference was made by the men, experts in their particular lines, of the growth of the great Heinz Co. pointing out that its first products were produced in a kitchen. The Can Company representatives were Messrs. F. A. Whittall, Montreal, director of sales, Continental Can Co. Ltd.; E. R. Lanchester, raw products research specialist, Research Department, Continental Can Co., Chicago; and A. D. Gifford, research department, Continental Can Co. of Canada Ltd., Toronto. The company, largest of its kind in the world, has its head office in Baltimore and branches in New York and Montreal.

Riley was appointed as a member of the executive in the place of the late Mrs. Lyons. The president, Major T. E. MacNutt, presided.

LONDON, Oct. 14—(CP Cable)—Commissioner David C. Lamb will leave Saturday for an extended tour of Canada, Salvation Army Headquarters, announced today. Commissioner Lamb will sail on the Empress of Britain and will be accompanied by Brigadier Owen Culshaw, Salvation Army Secretary for Empire Migration and Settlement. An authority on emigration, Commissioner Lamb was for 27 years director of the Salvation Army Emigration Department. He has frequently visited Canada in connection with Army migration and settlement activities.

Not Contemplating Cannery Here Mr. Whittall, interviewed shortly before his departure from the Province at noon yesterday declared that the interests he represented were not contemplating establishment of a canning plant in this Province. Their sole interest was in the sale of cans, he said. He believed, however, that there was a great opportunity for canning certain products here. The Province was ideally suited, from what he had seen, to the growth of many fruits and vegetables and other canning materials.

Experts Give Opinion The conference, presided over by Hon. B. W. LePage, chairman of the Economic Survey Committee, discussed the advisability of canning fruit and vegetables in the Province and the experts expressed the opinion that a great many fruits and vegetables could be profitably canned. It was pointed out to the conference, however, that corn, peas, and tomatoes could not be canned here with
